Ordinance No. 142.

An ordinance amending ordinance No. 130, the same being an ordinance entitled "An ordinance regulating the speed of Automobiles, Motorcycles, Carriages and all other conveyances, and the riding or driving of Horses, Mules and all other animals, and requiring Automobiles and other motor vehicles to carry lamps properly lighted during the hours of darkness when driven or operated in any Avenue, Street or Alley within the corporate limits of the Town of Lynden, Washington, and providing certain penalties for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance, and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LYNDEN.

Section I.
That Section One (1), of said Ordinance No. 130, shall be amended to read as follows:

Every person or persons who shall drive or operate, and every owner, lessee or other person in charge thereof who shall permit to be driven or operated in any avenue, street

No person or other licensee hereunder shall permit any minor under the age of twenty-one years to enter or loiter in any billiard or pool hall or room or keep his place of business open for the purpose of playing on said tables between the hours of eleven o'clock P. M. and six o'clock A. M. on week days and between the hours of eleven-thirty P. M. Saturdays and six o'clock A. M. Mondays, and during said closed periods all tables shall be covered and all pool and billiard balls shall be removed from sight of the public.
