**Notice of Collection of Local Improvement Assessment**

NOTICE is hereby given that the assessment and assessment roll for Local Improvement District No. 10, for the improvement of Third Street from the northerly line of Front Street to the northerly track of the Bellingham and Northern Railway Company's tracks in Pine Street, and Front Street from the easterly line of First Street to the easterly line of British Columbia Avenue on the south side of said Front Street, by asphalt pavement, etc., in the Town of Lynden, Washington is now in my hands for collection, and any assessment thereon or any portion of any such assessment may be paid at any time within thirty (30) days from the 14th day of January, 1915, and the owner of any lot, tract, parcel of land or other property charged with an assessment therein may redeem the same from all liability by paying the entire sum so charged without the costs, penalty, or interest within the said thirty days. All sums, or any portion of such sums so charged, remaining unpaid at the expiration of the said thirty days, may be paid in ten (10) equal annual installments at the rate of seven, (7), per cent per annum to the date of the next installment falling due, or the lien of any such assessment may be discharged at any time by paying the entire unpaid portion thereof with all penalties and costs attaching, together with all interest thereon to the date of delinquency of the next installment thereof falling due.

**LEGISLATURE OPENS:  
ECONOMY IS PLEDGED**

Economy is the word that is being overworked by the state legislature, now in session at Olympia. Every speech made thus far uses it many, many times.

Aside from organization, little has been accomplished thus far but oratory. 5The most important item under this head is the message of Governor Lister, which included many important recommendations.

The following are some of the things the Governor urges. Constitutional convention to remodel state government to reduce number of legislators.

Amendment to election laws for nomination of United States senators to conform with federal statutes.

Non-partisan elections for cities and counties.

Repeal or modification of second-choice voting.

Appropriation of \$50,000 to enforce prohibition.

Tuition fees in higher education.

Giving board of control full authority over state reformatory.

Appropriation of \$40,000 to transfer insane aliens to native countries.

Abolition of tax commission.

"First-aid law."

Appropriation of \$40,000 for state fair maintenance and \$10,000 for new buildings.

Adoption of a state flag.

The governor announced his opposition to the proposal to require registration by parties and to the plan to place all higher educational institutions under one board of regents.
