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Systematic Effort Should Be Made to Train Students in Military Art

By Professor W. E. STONE, President Purdue University

IN this institution military training is required by the federal law under which the institution is established.

It seems an entirely logical and desirable procedure that in a country whose defense in case of attack would rest in a volunteer citizen soldiery there should be some systematic effort to train its citizens at least in the elements of military art.

Ordinarily our youth have little or no interest in participation in military drill and discipline. I think this reflects the attitude of the average citizen, but so far as it is possible to train our young men and particularly those who are seeking a higher education IT SERVES TO PREPARE A NUCLEUS OF AT LEAST PARTIALLY TRAINED MEN ON WHOM THE COUNTRY COULD CALL IN CASE OF NEED.

Upward of one thousand students of the two lower classes in this institution receive training in the elementary school of the soldier. It is a good thing for them whether they ever participate in war or not, and they constitute without doubt a fine body of trained and educated young men available for leadership at a time of need.

IF THIS KIND OF TRAINING COULD BE MORE GENERAL IN ALL OF THE HIGHER SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES IT WOULD DO MUCH TO MAKE THE WHOLE SUBJECT MORE POPULAR AND WOULD IMPRESS UPON THE GENERAL PUBLIC THE VALUE AND NEED OF SUCH PREPARATION.
