COUNCIL DISCUSSES A BILLBOARD LAW

How to keep Lynden's residence district unscathed by billboards was the question considered by the city council Friday night.

The council discussed possible ordinances directed against the unsightly boards, and finally referred the matter to the judiciary committee, which will study the question and draw up regulations. These will be passed on by the council next Friday night.

The ordinance will probably require a license to be paid for the privilege of putting up billboards, and will establish restrictions on them. Boards that are erected in the business district will be considered from a fire danger standpoint.



SCHOOL TO TEACH VALUE OF THRIFT

To teach children the value of thrift, and of systematic saving, a savings bank system has been established in the Lynden schools.

How the plan will work was explained today by Superintendent P. A. Wright as follows:

"A plan of systematic saving has been installed in the Lynden school which should receive the hearty support of every patron.

"The plan briefly outlined, is as follows: Any boy or girl who is interested brings ten cents and is given a card of introduction by the teacher; he then takes the card and due to the bank—is given credit for the dime and receives a saving envelope from the banker. This envelope is used to deposit pennies and taken in from time to time and is placed in the bank as often as one dollar is collected. The pupil then becomes a regular patron of the bank and receives interest on his money the same as any depositor.

"At the end of each month each pupil makes a report to his teacher and the amount of money saved is noted.

"It is not the intention of the system to teach children to beg this money from their parents but to earn it in every case possible by performing useful tasks.

"If your child already has a bank account—why not let him work under this system from now on? It does not complicate matters at all and will make it possible for us to arouse greater interest along a necessary line. Talk to the banker or to any teacher."

CITY WELL WATER PURE, SAYS STATE

That the water in the new city well is free from bacterial contamination is the report made this week by Dr. T. D. Tuttle, commissioner of the State Board of Health. Samples of the water were taken by a representative of the Board, and analyzed.

Superintendent W. K. Pixley will discontinue the use of river water this week, as a result of this report, and use the new well exclusively.

The following is an extract from Dr. Tuttle's letter:

"The sample from well showed free from bacterial contamination. Following is a chemical report of analyses: Parts per 100,000.
