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## LIVESTOCK PRICES MAKE ADVANCE

That the price of livestock in the Nooksack Valley has bounded to a high point following the winter slump was indicated Friday at the public sale of A. De Bruyn, sr. on the Milan place. Bids for cows reached as high as \$127, a figure which has not been reached locally for several months.

The average price paid for the herd of thirty-five cows was \$61, with the twenty best animals averaging \$78. The four best ones went for \$100, \$103, \$105 and \$127 respectively. The highest 2-year-old heifer sold for \$89.

Good prices were also paid for the implements, and the sale which totalled \$3,500, is regarded as one of the most successful for some time. M. Vander Griend was the auctioneer.

The advance in the price of livestock is not unexpected, as many carloads were disposed of during the months when feed was scarce. With grass time at hand, a brisk demand for cows is noted.
