Poultrymen of Whatcom County will meet Friday at the Chamber of Commerce in Bellingham to pass on the plans for a state organization for cooperative buying and selling made at a preliminary meeting at Seattle last week.

Will Bauman acted as Whatcom County delegate at the Seattle meeting, and was appointed secretary of the committee on organization.

Another meeting will be held at Seattle Saturday, and delegates to this session will be named by the Whatcom poultrymen Friday.
