

**STATE WILL SELL LANDS
IN LYNDEN NEIGHBORHOOD**

The State of Washington will sell two parcels of land in the Lynden Land Commissioner today. announcement made by the State district next month, according to an The following is the official notice of the sale, describing the lands:

NOTICE OF SALE OF STATE LANDS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That on Tuesday, the 5th day of February, 1918, between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon, commencing at ten o'clock in the forenoon of said day, in front of the main entrance door to the County Court House in the city of Bellingham, county of Whatcom, State of Washington, either by the County Auditor of said county or by a member of the Board of State Land Commissioners of the State of Washington, the following described state lands, together with the improvements situated thereon, will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder therefor, to-wit:

Application No. 9865.
NE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of section 16, township 40 north, range 2 east W. M.,

containing 40 acres, more or less, according to the government survey thereof, appraised at \$2400.00 Improvements appraised at \$1250.00.

Application No. 9905.
NE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of section 16, township 40 north, range 2 east W. M., containing 40 acres, more or less, according to the government survey thereof, appraised at \$1600.00 Improvements appraised at \$1705.00

Said lands will be sold for not less than the appraised value above stated and upon the terms and conditions following:

Terms and Conditions of Sale.—Not less than one-tenth of the purchase price must be paid at the time of sale to the officer making the sale. The purchaser, if he be not the owner of the improvements, must forthwith pay to the officer making the sale the full amount of the appraised value of the improvements, as above stated. One-tenth of the purchase price must be paid annually thereafter, with interest on all deferred payments at the rate of six per centum per annum, together with accrued interest on any balance at the same rate: **Provided,** That any purchaser may make full payment of principal, interest and statutory fees at any

time and obtain deed or state patent. The purchaser of land containing timber or other valuable materials is prohibited by law from cutting or removing any such timber or materials without first obtaining consent of the Commissioner of Public Lands or the board, until the full amount of the purchase price has been paid and deed issued.

All sales of state lands are made subject to the reservations of oils, gases, coal, ores, minerals and fossils of every name, kind and description, and to the additional terms and conditions prescribed in the act of the legislature approved March 20, 1907, being section 3 of chapter 256 of the Laws of 1907.

Said land will be sold subject to the terms, conditions and reservations of chapter 109 of the Session Laws of 1911, relating to easements for rights-of-way and the carrying of timber, stone, mineral and other products over the same.

The above described lands are offered for sale in pursuance of an order of the Board of State Land Commissioners, and an order of sale duly issued and certified by the Commissioner of Public Lands of the State of Washington now on file in the

office of the county auditor of said county.

**CITY COUNCIL TO PERMIT
STANDARD OIL TO LOCATE HERE**

The city council Friday night passed the following ordinance, granting the Standard Oil Company permission to establish a branch in Lynden:

ORDINANCE NO. 172

AN ORDINANCE granting to the STANDARD OIL COMPANY, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain any warehouse, or tankage, or both, and other necessary buildings on a certain tract of land described as follows:

Lots five (5) six (6) seven (7) and eight (8) Block nineteen (19) Hawley and Lawrence's Addition to Lynden, Washington, for the storage and distribution of petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise handled by said company.

THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LYNDEN DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Standard Oil Company, a corporation, having asked permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain a warehouse, tankage, or both and other necessary buildings on a certain tract of ground described as follows:
Lots five (5) six (6) seven (7) and eight (8) Block nineteen (19) Hawley and Lawrence's Addition to Lynden, Washington, for the storage and distribution of petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise handled by said Company and the same having been considered by the Town Council of Lynden, it is hereby ordained and permission is hereby given and granted to the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, to locate, erect, operate and maintain a warehouse, tankage, or both, and other necessary buildings upon that certain tract of ground described as follows:

Lots five (5) six (6) seven (7) and eight (8) Block nineteen (19) Hawley and Lawrence's Addition to Lynden, Washington, for the storage and distribution of petroleum and its products, and other kinds of merchandise handled by said company.

Section 2. This ordinance shall

be published in the Lynden Tribune, a weekly newspaper published and printed in the Town of Lynden, and shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the expiration of thirty days after its passage and approval.
