STATE OFFERS BOYS TRAINING FOR MERCHANT MARINE WORK

The cordial co-operation of the Board of Regents and the University Authorities, of the University of Washington, Seattle, Wash., has made it possible for the Washington State Nautical School to have an attractive office building on the University campus convenient to their Training-ship Vicksburg. This will enable prospective Cadets or their parents to visit the ship and see how the Cadets will be cared for at the same time that they call at the office of the school.

The Washington State Nautical School is a State School, supported by the Federal Government and the State of Washington for the purpose of educating and training, only ambitious young men between the ages of 17 and 21 years and of good character, and then only a limited number, to qualify for Officers in the American Merchant Marine.

The school is under the direct control of a Board of Commissioners, appointed by the Governor of this State and consists of Capt. J. S. Gibson, Frank Waterhouse and E. J. Griffith, all prominent business men with large maritime interests, who are keen for this school because they appreciate the wonderful future of the American Merchant Marine which must carry with it the rapid advancement of young Ameri-

EXTRA TAX CARRIED BY VOTE OF 14 TO 0

Seven Thousand Additional For Lynden Schools Approved By Baker's Dozen And One

Fourteen voters appeared at the high school Saturday afternoon and expressed their approval of the extra ten mill levy to support the Lynden Schools. Their vote was unanimous in favor of the tax.

Increased expenses on account of the heavy enrollment and extra war costs brought about a deficit in the 1920 budget, and the election was called to increase the school appropriation. Seven thousand dollars were added to the funds by the vote of the fourteen Saturday.

NIGHT AND DAY CAMP IS LIFE SAVING STATION



Tuberculosis kills 150,000 persons in the United States every year. These two women escaped. They are shown in the Night and Day Camp conducted by the St. Louis Society for the Relief and Prevention of Tuberculosis. They are among the fortunate ones because they knew how to take care of themselves when this great menace threatened them. They knew that the cure lies in plenty of fresh air, even if the temperature is away below freezing, sunlight, good food and rest under proper medical supervision. Tuberculosis is not only curable but is preventable as well. The prevention lies largely in right living, in building up a strong bodily resistance. Eight out of ten persons are infected at some time in their lives, according to figures of the National Tuberculosis Association, the leading agency in the United States in the fight upon this disease. This organization is sponsor for the annual Red Cross Christmas Seal sale, from which the funds to carry on the work throughout the year are chiefly derived.

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
