REPUBLICANS WIN IN LYNDEN VOTING

Capture Everything at Local Polls By
Good Majority; Harding and Hart
Lead in Lynden

Lynden gave the Republicans a healthy majority for every office on Tuesday, soaked the Carlyon bill, and endorsed the soldiers' bonus five to one.

Harding received a vote of 246, as against 64 for Cox and 76 for Christensen. The vote for governor was Hart 219, Black 73, Bridges 121. Hadley received a 100 vote majority over Bouck, while Jones was 139 in advance of France.

George Cook, county clerk, led the ticket in Lynden with 267 votes. Jake Le Compte was elected constable and Frank Le Cocq justice of the peace.

REPUBLICANS WIN IN IDAHO

Gooding is Chosen Over Nugent in Senate Race.

Boise, Idaho.—Senator Harding for president, Frank R. Gooding, Republican candidate for United States senator, and D. W. Davis, present Republican governor of Idaho, together with the balance of the congressional and state ticket have carried this state with pluralities running from 15,000 to 25,000 or more. Late returns, although far from complete, in the state clearly indicated this. Some of the strongest counties in the state, including Shoshone in the north, went Republican.

Republican counties went exceptionally strong for the Republican ticket. The ticket apparently elected on the returns by safe majorities follows: President, Warren G. Harding; senator, Frank R. Gooding; representatives, first district, Burton L. French, second district, Addison T. Smith.

Harding Sends Coolidge Good Wishes.

Marion, O.—At 11 o'clock Tuesday night, Senator Harding sent the following telegram to Governor Coolidge: "My heartiest congratulations over the great Republican victory to which your strength added so materially. You are to expect to play a full part in the coming Republican administration. Good wishes." To Will H. Hays, Republican national chairman, Mr. Harding telegraphed: "My gratitude along with congratulations on your capable and successful management of a great campaign."

RED CROSS TO HOLD ANNUAL ROLL-CALL

Membership Campaign Scheduled To Open In Lynden Next Week; Work of Organization Varied

Red Cross Roll Call—the fourth annual re-enlistment of members in the American organization—will be held here November 11 to 25. Officers in charge of the Roll Call for the chapter of which this city forms a part, however, feel that the canvass in this section practically can be completed within the first week of the time set should the present plans for intensive work be followed out.

In all its work preparatory to the Roll Call the Red Cross this year, as last, has laid stress on the point that the movement is purely a dues-gathering activity, and not to be confused with "drives" or other campaigns. The national body also is laying emphasis on the fact that more than 50 per cent of all membership fees secured here remain in this community, and on the low "overhead" cost of the organization.

"While the Red Cross has not been subjected to that violent criticism of extravagance and waste which has been attached to some activities resulting from the war and its after-effects," said an officer of the national body recently, "we are pleased to be able to make public the fact that management cost at national headquarters and in the 14 divisions has amounted to less than 4 per cent of the total expenditures by the organization. This is a turnover expense so small as to establish a mark for many a commercial concern to work toward, and on its face proves that for the Red Cross, organization efficiency and economy are not only ideals but achievements."

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HARDING AND G. O. P. CANDIDATES WIN OUT

Republicans Victorious in National, State and County Elections; Brown Beats Pemberton

Warren G. Harding has been elected president with 346 electoral votes already assured, and Louis F. Hart has been chosen governor of Washington, his majority over Bridges being 61,406 votes with 1537 precincts reported out of 2378.

The Republicans will have a majority of ten in the senate, and about 100 in the house. The entire state Republican ticket was elected, and Harding carried Washington by more than 100,000.

The Carlyon bill was defeated, as were the two amendments. The bonus bill carried.

W. P. Brown has defeated W. H. Pemberton for judge. Unofficial returns given out at the courthouse this morning gave Brown a lead of 198 votes. State and Valley precincts in Whatcom, and Shaw Island in San Juan are missing, but the total vote of these precincts does not run over 100.

CREAMERY PAYS MEMBERS EXTRA 3 CTS. A LB FOR PRODUCT

Dairymen not members of the Whatcom County Dairymen's Association, are now receiving 3 cents a pound less for their butterfat from the Lynden plant. The decision to give members an extra three cents was made at a meeting held in Lynden Oct. 23.

The move was made in order to induce the outsiders to join the work of the association, and at the same time, to show the members that it pays to belong to the organization.

Because in some cases the hauling distance has become longer, the stockholders decided to increase the hauling charge from one to two cents a pound for butterfat.
