The following is Chairman Veleke's statement:

To the Voters of Lynden Township:

The Township election is to be held at the Lynden Township Hall, Tuesday, March 1st, 1921, and we, the Township Trustees, do hereby not only request, but we insist that all who are interested in taxation come and cast your vote.

The Township Board will hold an open business meeting at the Township Hall at ten o'clock, P. M., Tuesday, March 1st, 1921, at which time the tax levy will be discussed. Heretofore there has been very little interest taken in this election but it is when the tax statements are received that you get interested. This is why we urge you to use your rights in helping make the levy.

We too ask that you bear in mind the Board holds an equalization meeting at which time all may appear to put in their complaint providing they are not satisfied.

If you are interested come out to the election, March first, and express your views, then vote accordingly.


