

POULTRYMEN MUST TEACH PUBLIC TO EAT MORE EGGS

Egg production must slow up, or more eggs must be eaten, is the warning of W. D. Buchanan, extension poultry specialist of the State College. The Government report shows twice as many eggs in storage as a year ago. This is undoubtedly caused by the wonderful increase in production, and the decrease in consumption of eggs.

In order to reduce egg production, each poultryman must produce fewer eggs, or some quit entirely and let the others go on as before. Should an attempt be made to slow up production by decreasing the number of eggs per hen, then there will be a dead loss. If production is halted by reducing the number of hens, beyond the usual rejection of culls, the market will be glutted with hens and so the poultryman will suffer loss. The same thing will happen if part of the poultrymen sell out, while the remainder stay in the business, only in this case those who quit take the loss, while those who stay will reap the benefit.

"Instead of yielding to hopeless despair, or blaming the public for not

eating eggs, the poultrymen" says Mr. Buchanan, "should become alive to their own interests. They should advertise the food value of eggs, just as the dairymen are advertising the value of milk and the citrus growers are advertising the value of citrus fruits.

"Eggs have a food value that may be easily demonstrated. They are not as rich in heat units as milk, but are nearly four times as rich in protein and proteins are the most valuable and costly of all foods. The fact that a new laid egg, kept in proper temperature for three weeks, will develop a complete chick, with bone, muscles, organs, tissues and intelligence, is unanswerable proof of the food value of an egg."
