## NOTED ACTOR COMING TO LYNDEN TUESDAY

Frederick Warde, Distinguished Star, Will Open Lyceum Course at High School

Frederick Warde, distinguished actor, author and lecturer, will open Lynden's lyceum course Tuesday evening at the high school with a vivid story of his stage experiences for the past half-century.

For more than fifty years, Warde has been a leading actor in the classic drama. His associates and contemporaries have been the foremost actors of the English speaking stage. Henry Irving, Lawrence Barrett, Adolphe Neilson, Charlotte Cushman, Edwin Booth and many others have been closely identified in the career of Frederick Warde.

The past winter found Mr. Warde in the leading role of the famous Los Angeles Mission Play at San Gabriel—the American Oberammergau—where his masterly interpretation created comment throughout the entire West.

Mr. Warde's lecture, "Fifty Years of Make Believe," is a fascinating story of stage life that breathes of the great characters of the drama. Delivered with the consummate skill of a wonderful actor, it is sure to be one of the strongest numbers on the Lynden lyceum course.

## TO TELL LYNDEN PEOPLE HOW TO TRAP DESTRUCTIVE MOLES

The U. S. Department of Agriculture is sending a specialist in charge of Mole Control to Whatcom County, for the purpose of holding a series of meetings from December 5th to 9th. He will give demonstrations of trapping moles and preparing the pelts for market, at the various meetings mentioned below.

Mr. L. K. Couch is in charge of these demonstrations and is working in co-operation with Mrs. Robin, County Superintendent of Schools, High School Superintendents and H. B. Carroll, Jr., County Agent.

- Wednesday, December 7th, 1:30 P. M., Birch Bay School.
- Thursday, December 8th, 10:30 A. M., Harmony High School.
- Thursday, December 8th, 1:30 P. M., Deming High School.
- Friday, December 9th, 10:30 A. M., Sumas High School.
- Friday, December 9th, 1:30 P. M., Nooksack High School.

## Buy Seals by the Thousand!

1. Tuberculosis strikes the rich, the poor, the brilliant, the stupid, the weak, the strong. It strikes 1 person every 3 1/2 minutes, 17 persons every hour, and 400 daily. No one knows where or when it will strike. It strikes at least 1 in every 100 persons.

2. Everybody runs a chance of being exposed to tuberculosis. Most men and women have been infected during childhood.

3. Few families escape this plague. One-tenth of all those who die in the United States have succumbed to tuberculosis. Everybody should join the fight to stamp out such a destructive enemy.

4. Clergymen can help by cooperation with existing agencies working for the prevention of tuberculosis; by securing adequate provision for indigent members of their churches; by distributing literature and educating people about tuberculosis.

5. Physicians can help by insisting that all their patients should be examined regularly once a year at least, whether they are sick or not, and by seeking in every way to prevent as well as to treat disease.

6. Teachers can help by instructing pupils as to the nature, prevention and cure of tuberculosis; by teaching children simple rules of health; by keeping the classroom well-ventilated and by organizing Modern Health Crusades.

7. Parents can help by keeping the home clean and well-ventilated; by teaching their children and other members of their families to sleep with windows open; by providing proper and nourishing food; by observing the laws of personal hygiene; and by keeping small children away from infected persons.

8. Children can help by keeping clean; by not putting anything into their mouths except food; by staying as much as possible in the fresh air and the sunshine; by eating clean, nourishing food.

9. Workers can help by insisting on well-ventilated working places; by avoiding dust and dampness; by refusing to work in dust workrooms; by avoiding the overwork that comes from long, inhuman hours; and by demanding proper sanitary appliances and facilities in shop and community.

10. All these groups may join by cooperating with the leaders of the fight, the National Tuberculosis Association, and its 1,200 affiliated state and local organizations. They have been battling the disease for 16 years and they need you lined up in the fight. Join the fight by buying Christmas Seals.

## LYNDEN ASKED TO AID BATTLE TUBERCULOSIS

Sale of Christmas Seals Stars Here; Funds To Be Used for Work in Whatcom County

To join in the war to stamp out tuberculosis in the Lynden district, as well as in centers all over the land, Lynden is purchasing Red Cross Christmas seals this week. Every home in the district will be visited, and all urged to share in the campaign against the great White Plague.

Mrs. E. Edson is in charge of the stamp sale here this year, and she has assisting her a committee of Lynden women, and the pupils of the Lynden schools.

"Every letter that goes out from Lynden during December should bear one of the Christmas seals," said Mrs. Edson today. "Buy them by the hundred—millions of dollars are needed to combat tuberculosis in this country. A portion of the funds will be used directly in the Lynden district, where we know to our sorrow that this terrible disease is finding its victims."

"The county tuberculosis nurse is paid out of the Christmas seals fund. Last year, she handled more than 600 cases in Whatcom County."

"Those who buy stamps are asked to stick one over their doorbell so that other solicitors may know that that home has done its share."

"Buy stamps—and buy them by the hundred and the thousand."

## DISTRICT TO VOTE AT ELECTION SATURDAY

Lynden Will Ballot on Single Ticket at Annual Municipal Election; W. H. Elder Named for Director

The Lynden district will vote Saturday at municipal, port and school elections simultaneously. In the city, polls will be open from eight in the morning to eight at night.

Following a precedent that has been established here for more than six years, but a single ticket will be on the ballot in the Lynden city election. Retiring officers have all been renominated. Candidates are E. Edson for mayor, A. A. Bauman and P. M. Serrurier for councilmen, and J. T. Zylstra for treasurer.

Lynden will vote at the city hall for the first precinct, east of 5th Street, and at the high school for the district west of 5th Street.

W. H. Elder is the only candidate whose name will appear on the ballot in the school election. Mr. Elder was named at the official caucus as a candidate for school director to succeed Frank E. Knapp, who is retiring after ten years of service.

A seven mill extra levy will be voted on in the school election to provide for the school expenses for the year 1922-23. The change in the election laws makes it necessary for the board to ask for this amount at this time. Last year, ten extra mills were needed to carry out the school work.

Voters in the school districts in the neighborhood of Lynden, will pass on a proposal to form a Union High School district here to take over the management of the high school jointly. Each district would continue to manage its own grade school.
