MAY SEND MORE MEN TO PATROL BORDER

Officials Visit Lynden Customs Station and Decide To Fight Harder Against Smuggling

Increase of the staff at the Lynden customs office in order to patrol the border better to prevent smuggling of narcotics and liquor, is expected to follow the visit to the city last week of Roy C. Lyle, federal prohibition inspector and Millard T. Hartson, collector of customs for the state.

Collector Hartson has announced that a heavy customs patrol will be established to cover every one of the twenty-two roads leading from British Columbia into Western Washington. It is estimated that eighty per cent of the liquor brought into Washington is smuggled by water routes, with the remaining twenty per cent coming by automobiles, the larger part through Whatcom County.

Inspector Paul O. Dolstad of the Lynden station announced this week that H. E. Morris of Seattle had been assigned to assist him at this station. The Lynden office is now located in Mr. Dolstad's new home on the Lynden-Ferndale paving, a short distance east of the Guide Meridian.

AXLUND AND NEIDHART OPEN SHINGLE MILL AT BOUNDARY

Ben Axlund and George Neidhart have built and started operation of a shingle mill at the boundary line, near the site of the Boundary Mill, which was destroyed by fire.

The mill has a capacity of 20,000, and is employing four men. It is now the only shingle mill operating in the Lynden district.
