## LYNDEN ADDS TRACK VICTORY TO HONORS

By Winning Field Meet From County Schools

By winning the county high school field meet at the Fair Grounds Saturday, Coach Fred Rocky's Lynden High School team rounded out a year of championships in all branches of school sports. Basketball and baseball victories were annexed during the year.

Lynden won the meet with a score of 67 points. Blaine was second with 57 1/2 points, Ferndale third with 16 and Mount Baker fourth with 5 1/2 points.

Mountain View and Blaine grade schools were tied for first place in Group 2. Mt. Baker won the girls' meet.

Hanson of Blaine, established a new county record of 45 ft., 6 inches in the shotput; the old record was 42 feet. Hanson took first in three events, second in three, and third in three. Havelman of Lynden finished first in three events, and won a second and third place.

## INTEREST AROUSED IN DRAINAGE PLAN

Farmers To Meet at Hawley's Hall Tuesday To Discuss Proposed Giant District

A plan for the formation of one big drainage district to provide for the entire district north of Lynden, will be given a hearing Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock at Hawley's Hall, with scores of farmers interested in the project in attendance.

The plan is causing no small discussion, as the large size of the proposed district would bring in hundreds of farms, and the merits of the project are being argued back and forth. With a single district, it is pointed out, the entire question of drainage can be handled on a comprehensive scale, and arrangements can be made to keep the ditches cleaned out and in working condition.

All farmers interested are asked to be at Hawley's Hall Tuesday evening.

## EARLMA RUSCO WINS DECLAMATORY

Lynden Girl Defeats Contestants From Other County High Schools

Another victory was brought to Lynden this year, with the winning of the declamatory contest Saturday evening. Miss Earlima Rusco took first place, with her presentation of "Sally Ann's Experience."

Six bids for the bonds were received. They were sold to Ferris and Hargrove of Seattle, on a basis to bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent. Cancellation of the 6 per cent warrants nets the district 1/2 of one per cent, \$112.50 annually.

That's Saving No. 1.

Ferris and Hargrove in addition paid a cash premium into the treasury of the district of \$157.50. That's Saving No. 2.

They further agreed to pay all the costs of issuing the bonds, making a third saving for the Lynden district.

Other school districts that have been having financial difficulties are considering the plan devised by Lynden's school board for lifting themselves up by the bootstraps, and actually getting a foot or two off the ground.

The range of prices was not high, but the results were considered good for an opening sale of this kind. A wide distribution was given to the stock sold, and a general improvement as a result of this dispersion among various herds is bound to occur.

It is planned to make the sale an annual event.
