A SPLENDID INDUSTRY

Hulin Fruit Evaporator Makes A Big Market.

Handles Easily About Fifteen Tons Daily of Green Fruits and Running Full Time.

With the erection and successful operation of the large fruit and vegetable evaporating plant of Hulin Bros., Colfax and all surrounding country, has secured an industry of which it may well be proud. It means much to the owners of prune orchards, of which there are many acres within reaching distance of Colfax.

There are about 15 employees in the dry house. The expense of operating is about \$30 a day, but it is a still greater factor in furnishing employment, as it gives many work in the orchards and as teamsters. At least \$75 or \$100 a day are scattered through its agency outside of the price received by the owners.

The plant is of the Stevens patent, doing excellent work, and is under direct supervision of F. M. and C. Curtis, brothers, of long experience in the business. At the close of the prune season in two or three weeks apples, vegetables, etc., will be handled.
