

BRYAN IS ABANDONED

Fusionists Desperate in Attempt To Re-Elect Rogers.

All Other Candidates Are Being Sacrificed and Traded To This End.

Seattle, October 10.—(Special correspondence.)—It must be confessed that until within the past two or three weeks republican campaigners and managers were a trifle worried over the first reports coming from Whitman county, showing a dangerous condition of apathy among republicans in a county where the strongest possible light should be put up. But this is changed to a better and strongly sanguine feeling since the appearance of speakers. From all sections of Whitman county most encouraging reports, giving reasons why the republican ticket will win, have been steadily pouring into state headquarters, and that discomfiture awaits the fusionists in Whitman.

Abandoned Hope.

The fusion press has continually misrepresented Senator Frink, republican nominee for governor. They have abandoned all hope in this state of winning for Bryan or for their congressmen, and in the desire to save something from the wreck they are concentrating all their force in the supreme effort to elect Rogers to a second term. To accomplish this, nothing is being done in truth to say against Senator Frink, they are making up their deficiencies by a persistent and shameless misrepresentation. Senator Frink's record is above reproach in his attitude towards the farming industries. He voted for the Watson bill. He voted for the Anderson bill. He voted to indefinitely postpone the Helm bill, just as Senator Helm himself did, because it was blocking action on the Morgan bill, which was identical to the same as the Helm bill. The Morgan bill was introduced in the house of representatives, and having passed that body, came up in the senate for action before the Helm bill. For this reason, Senator Frink, along with Senator Helm, voted to indefinitely postpone the Helm bill. Senator Frink was absent on legislative duty when the vote was taken on the Morgan bill. When Senator Crow moved to reconsider the vote by which the Morgan bill was defeated, Senator Frink voted for its reconsideration, and thus showed his friendliness to the measure.

The bill to create a railway commission was defeated not by the republicans, but by the fusionists themselves. It was a rider tacked on another bill near the close of the session of the legislature, and was foisted on the legislature by the henchmen of Rogers in order to place power in his hands which his own party deemed would be disastrous at the time, and hence, voted against it. The republicans voted against it on the ground that it came at a late hour in the session and its consideration would block other important legislation and cause the necessity for an extra session. Senator Frink voted against the barefoot school boy bill, as it is thought the majority of the Whitman county delegation did. This bill would have granted \$60,000 annually from the pockets of the tax payers of Seattle, which was Senator Frink's constituency. He stood by the demands of his constituency in refusing to support the bill, and would have received the denunciation of everyone had he not been true to his people who had elected him to this responsible position.

His vote in this respect simply demonstrates how loyal he would be to his broader and more varied constituency when elected to the governorship of the state.

As a man, he is above reproach; successful in business; firm in execution; sincere in all of his life; honorable in every transaction whether political, business, social or otherwise, and just such a man as would make an ideal governor.

School Book Scandal.

The people have begun to hear of the infamous school book fraud perpetrated by the fusion superintendent of public instruction, Frank J. Browne, who is the presiding officer of the state board of education, and the four appointees of Governor Rogers on the board, and for whose actions in so gross a perpetration he is directly responsible. The people will hear more of this, as there is more to tell. They will also hear of many other items of maladministration, which will be presented and proved to a demonstration in this campaign.
