NORTHWEST NEWS.

The O. R. & N. Company is making many improvements in its track and road bed. The curves are being straightened and grades reduced so that much better time is made by freight and passenger trains and there is a great saving in fuel and wear and tear of rolling stock.

About 600 cavalry horses were shipped from Vancouver, Wash., last week to Seattle where they will be put aboard a transport for Manila.

Chas Kramer of Republic lost \$100 on Bryan and hung himself in a slaughter house.

At Jacksonville, Oregon, Saturday night G. W. Traylor shot through a window and killed J. Hardenbrook, while the latter was calling upon Traylor's sister-in-law, Miss Sarah L. Beeson. Traylor then killed himself. No reason for the deed is known, except that Traylor had said Hardenbrook should never marry the girl. They had never quarreled.

The state treasurer has made a call for state warrants on the general fund to the amount of \$135,555. The call covers warrants numbered 61,711 to 63,711, inclusive, and interest ceases on them December 10, 1900.

The motion for a new trial and arrest of judgment in the case of the United States against Robert Potts, convicted of fencing in government land in Adams county, was denied by Judge Hanford, and Potts was sentenced by the court to one day in the Spokane county jail and to pay a fine of \$100 and the costs of prosecution.

James Moran, of Marysville, Wash., attempted to kill his seven-months-old baby Friday afternoon while on a drunken spree. He was arrested and examined before Justice Sutherland and bound over to the superior court.

At Forest Grove, in Whatcom county, a few days ago, F. W. Prouty's 5-year-old son went into the barn, and is supposed to have engaged himself in the pastime of striking matches. The barn

caught fire and burned to the ground. The boy was burned to death, as were five head of horses and 50 tons of hay. Other farm belongings were consumed, causing a financial loss of \$2,500.

West Coast Trade reports the market for butter weak and heavy at Tacoma. The tendency is towards lower prices. Washington creamery is quoted at 29 cents per pound; eastern at 25 and 27 cents.

The Pacific Rural Press reports the market for potatoes rather slow and weak at San Francisco. Salina Burbanks are quoted at \$1.00@1.25 per cental; Oregon Burbanks, 55 and 90 cents per cental, and River Burbanks, 30 and 60 cents per cental.

A fight between a Roman Catholic and a Greek at Wilkeson, Wash., Sunday, grew into a pitched battle, with 200 Greeks against as many Roman Catholics, the fighters on both sides being coalminers. Clubs and iron bars were used and several heads were broken. Finally revolvers were brought into use, and bullets caused the mob to flee. No one was killed.

A tramp found a letter several days ago at Athena, Oregon, and turned it over to A. M. Gillis, to whom it was addressed. When Mr. Gillis opened it he found a check for \$4000 inclosed.

The next legislature will be asked to create the new county of Riverside by division of Yakima county, with the county seat at Prosser.

The insurance of \$7000 on Gray & Gray's flouring mill at Palouse, burned a few weeks ago, has been satisfactorily adjusted. It has not yet been determined whether the mill will be rebuilt.

John Bradekey, 75 years old who lived near Viola Idaho, returned Friday from a trip to Kansas. He left the train at Palouse and went to the postoffice, where he suddenly fell dead from heart failure. James Orendorff, 65 years of age, was also found dead on his doorstep near Princeton the same morning.

The supply of beef animals in the Palouse country is very limited and local butchers find considerable difficulty in securing enough animals to supply the demands. It is feared that beef animals will have to be shipped in to supply the local demand for butchering within a few months.

Oakdale Sun: Dan, Barbee, age 14, and Harold Smith, age 8, were fined today by Justice Myrswell \$5 and \$2 and costs, respectively for throwing stones through the window of an O. R. & N. caboose. A traveling man from Portland who was in the caboose at the time was slightly cut about the face by flying glass. The judge says he was lenient with the boys on account of their age and it being their first offense.

Pullman Tribune: Lee Smith, ex-United States volunteer, who served in Manila, has decided to return to that far away country, and engage in business. He bade his relatives and friends farewell and left for that climate yesterday, via Seattle.

Pullman was enlivened a few mornings ago by a knock down and drag out set to between A. B. Baker and J. J. Murray, candidates respectively for mayor and city clerk on opposing tickets. Mr. Baker is said to have come off second best.

Tekoa Topic: Through A. Cohn the Tekoa Co. sold 50,000 bushels of wheat last week in Portland. This is the largest pool from this section of the state ever sold at one time. All of it was grown near Tekoa.

J. G. Conger of Albany, Oregon, has purchased the Kennedy and Aschenbrenner farms, comprising 320 acres, near Farmington.

It is reported that Mr. Harbaugh, who has a farm near Farmington, is loser to the extent of about 500 sacks of potatoes which he had dug and standing in the field when the recent hard freeze came on.

J. B. Van Patton, according to the Farmington Times, has purchased the Andy Gregg farm, near that town.
