HOW TO SERVE ICES.

Some Simple and Some Ornamental Ways.
At this time of the year when ices form the most popular desserts it is a good thing to know how to serve them attractively, particularly when there is company at dinner and the hostess wishes a rather fancy effect at a slight cost. One of the simplest ways is to put the ice cream in champagne glasses and to surmount it with a couple of spoonfuls of whipped cream sprinkled with grated almonds. Raspberry sherbet is particularly good when served this way. Another idea is to hollow out the individual cones of ice cream and fill them with crushed fruit of a color to correspond. For instance, a pink ice cream will contain crushed raspberries, a vanilla ice cream sliced pineapple, and so forth. The effect is very pretty when the ice served to each person is of a different color.
When something more elaborate is desired, serving the ices in flower cups will be found a good way. Again the color of the ices should match the flower. At a rose luncheon recently the ices were held in rose cups of different shades. These roses were made of crepe paper, and they were fastened to real rose stems with the natural foliage. They also rested on a little bed of rose leaves so that the effect was quite natural. These rose cups can easily be made at home by any woman who is clever with her fingers.
In the first place make the shell of heavy writing paper, cutting it out in a circle and shaping it by pressing it down over the bottom of an inverted tumbler. Next turn the shell upward and glue around the edges a row of small rose leaves. Make two rows of these, the lower having larger leaves than the upper. Place a third row of large inter petals on the lower edge of the shell. When the petals have dried sufficiently, curl them by running them between a knife blade and your thumb. Next fasten a long, handsome rose stem with the foliage and thorns to one side of the rose and your cup is finished, with the exception of the inner shell of oiled paper which holds the cream.
The ices served in these roses should be molded quite hard into pyramids by means of the little cones which can be procured at any confectioner's. This scheme of decoration can be carried out with almost any flowers, and it is also very dainty when the cups are concealed in bunches of artificial violets which are perfumed with Russian violet extract. Hard Boiled Eggs For Poultry.

I notice in some of the poultry papers a sharp criticism on feeding hard boiled eggs to turkey poults. Now, I feed a certain per cent of hard boiled eggs with most excellent results. Years ago, before I adopted my present way of feeding, I lost fully half that hatched. Since adopting my present plan I raise 95 per cent, barring accidents. Last year I had fifty or more killed on the railroad or by dogs. This year I have been fortunate enough to prevent any being killed and have a large drove. I have lost some, I hardly know how. There were no sick ones. It was after they were turned on the range, and they just came up missing. As I turned them out to run before the hay and oats were cut I think they probably got tangled in the long grass. Only a few from each flock were missing.
I think persons who condemn the hard boiled egg imagine that it is made an exclusive diet, when it only makes perhaps one-third of a meal twice a day, green food one-third, oatmeal or millet the other third. Eggs put in cold water and boiled a long time are very different to digest than eggs put in boiling water.—Mrs. Charles Jones in Poultry Keeper.
