

MAY BOARD MEETING

Road District Claims, Bonds Approved.

Regular Salary Claims Allowed, Cost Bills, Road and Bridge Claims, Tax Matters.

Pursuant to adjournment of the Board of County Commissioners of Whitman County, Washington, met on the 4th day of May, 1903, all members being present:

The following claims were examined and allowed on the current expense fund.

Table listing various claims and expenses, including salaries for county treasurer, auditor, and other officials, as well as costs for road and bridge work.

Road & Bridge Claims. The following road and bridge claims were examined and allowed on the road and bridge fund:

Road District Claims. The following claims were examined and allowed on the various road districts:

The county auditor was granted an appropriation of \$50.00 for the expense of his office.

On requisition of G. A. R. Post No. 16 at Garfield, Richard T. Lyon was granted an allowance of \$25.00.

The board approved the plat of Lockhart's addition to the town of St. John, Wash.

The resignation of R. S. Booth as supervisor of road district No. 6 was accepted and B. Atherton was appointed supervisor.

The resignation of R. C. Clancy as supervisor of road district No. 5 was accepted and A. B. Ford appointed supervisor.

The appointment of C. W. Bean as deputy county clerk was approved.

The following bonds were approved: T. D. Ferguson and W. N. Divine as county physicians, A. L. Daniel, constable...

The certificate of alterations of school districts Nos. 5 and 8 was filed by the superintendent of schools, which transferred 5 1/2 of section 29, tp. 15 N., R. 43, from Dist. No. 5 to Dist. No. 8, was approved.

Mrs. M. L. Mohs was given permission to construct a stock chute across the county road in ne 1/4 Sec. 7-20-40, the same to be built under the directions of the supervisor.

The petition of Sophia W. Ringer for the vacation of B street in Ringer's addition to Pullman was granted.

G. F. Barber was given a refunding order for \$1.64 for school district tax erroneously assessed.

1900, 1901 and 1902, the property being owned by the M. E. church of Palouse, was granted.

The application of E. R. Smith for the cancellation of tax of \$17.47 charged against lot 1 in ne 1/4 of 25-13-43, was granted.

The application of Ira Nye for the correction of assessment of E. Lindley on personal property for the year 1902, was granted.

The application of John Bishop for the cancellation of tax charged against 12 acres in the se 1/4 of ne 1/4 of 11-17-44 granted, on account of error in assessment.

The application of R. H. Reid for the cancellation of tax on \$820.00 valuation assessed against ne 1/4 of ne 1/4 of 20-16-45 for the years 1901 and 1902 was granted.

Road Matters. Upon the application of M. E. Choate and others the surveyor was instructed to make a survey of the proposed M. E. Choate road.

Upon the application of S. O. Harrington and others the surveyor was instructed to make a survey of the proposed Harrington road.

Upon the application of Joseph Stevick and others the surveyor was instructed to make an examination and survey of the proposed Stevick change in the Colfax and Almota road.

The board fixed the time for hearing the surveyor's reports of the following named roads, to-wit: J. P. Nietz road, May 5, 1903, at 11 o'clock.

Shawnee and Riverside road, May 5, 1903, at 2 o'clock. Taylor change in Hegler road, June 1, 1903, at 2 o'clock.

Nelson change Staley road, June 4, 1903, at 11 o'clock. White extension to Funston, June 4, 1903, at 11 o'clock.

W. S. Imbler change Phillips June 4, 1903, at 2 o'clock. W. S. Imbler road, June 4, 1903, at 3 o'clock.

S. P. Shawgo road, June 5, 1903, at 11 o'clock. Helling change S. E. Fiach, June 5, 1903 at 1 o'clock.

Wilson change in Wilson, June 5, 1903, at 1:30 o'clock. The county surveyor was instructed to survey an extension to the Gaines and Bonark road, commencing on the section line between sections 7 and 12, where the survey of the road intersects the section line, thence west across the s 1/2 of Sec. 12, across the land of J. M. Dell and Ross to connect with the James Jennings road and report his findings at the next meeting of the board.

The Auditor was instructed to draw his warrant for \$50.00 to William Huntley for additional damages in the S. S. Allen road and to tender Mr. Huntley \$300.00 damages for right of way across his land.

Henry Rock was awarded \$187.40 for damages in the establishment of the East road across his land. The application of T. A. Sanders and others to have the obstructions removed from the John Kealey road and the road opened at once for travel, was granted.

The auditor was instructed to notify the supervisor in whose road district the Vantine change in Draper road is located, to open the road for public travel. The Mud Springs and Hay Station road was established and the following damages were allowed:

Table listing damages allowed for road work, including items like 'A Schreck', 'L Schurck', 'I M Curtis', 'Valentine Scheffauer'.

The L. M. Ringer road was established and damages were awarded as follows: J W Reese \$35.00, Eula Menard \$57.03, C B Kogley \$122.60.
