WORK THE CRIMINALS

Thornton Farmer Thinks Canutt's Policy is Good.

"A Hobo Doesn't Like to Work Any Better Than the Commoner Likes to Tell the Truth."

Thornton, Wash., June 17, 1903.—Editor Gazette: I would appreciate very much the privilege of being allowed to express, through the columns of your paper, my thoughts regarding the course which Sheriff Canutt is pursuing in regard to the working of petty criminals and hoboes upon the county roads. I have been a resident of Whitman county for a number of years and I have occasion to know that too much work cannot be expended upon the public highways. I have also had occasion at different times to realize something of the character of the men whom the strong arm of the law finds it necessary to take in charge, and I wish right here to state that Mr. Canutt and his force of deputies have the hearty moral support of the majority of taxpayers and citizens in my vicinity.

The residents of Thornton and surrounding country have occasion to visit the county seat as frequently as the citizens of any part of the county and a great many of us are accustomed to drive to Colfax. This being the case, we notice and appreciate any improvement which is made to the public roads. It is a noticeable fact that the road leading into Colfax from the north is now in a much better condition than I have ever known it before. This has been one of the worst grades in the entire county, because of the fact that it follows so closely the conform of the hills. There are a number of springs along this grade and at times, even in dry weather, there were pools and holes in the middle of the road which would almost mire a horse. These have been remedied to a marked extent and the sheriff is to be congratulated upon the present condition of the road, for I thoroughly believe that it is through his efforts entirely that the work has been carried on.

I noticed an article in the Colfax Commoner sometime ago which said, in effect, that it would be a pleasant diversion for the hoboes and petty criminals to get out and work around the county roads; that it would only be a pleasant exercise for them and that they would enjoy it rather than be confined in the jail all of the time. The writer of that article is surely a queerly constituted man if he really thinks that a hobo would rather work than to loaf. He shows by his writing that he does not know much of the traits of these creatures, or he is endeavoring to keep the sheriff's office from doing just what the people want it to do, thereby making congratulatory capital to be used against Mr. Canutt in the next campaign. In either event I do not consider that the Commoner is in any way standing for the best interests of the farmers of Whitman county.

In closing allow me to say that the people who drive over the county roads are capable of judging for themselves what improvements are needed along the highways. The work which the sheriff and his gang of criminals are now doing is appreciated by the farmers every time they have occasion to drive to Colfax. And I also wish to say that the people in my neighborhood hope that the work will be continued as long as their are enough of the off-scouring of the earth confined in the county jail to make a gang. With that class of criminals working upon the roads the county will in the course of time be practically freed of the element, for they will certainly shun the chain gang if they

have the opportunity. A hobo doesn't like to work any better than the Commoner likes to tell the truth.

Veterans Will Camp.

The sixth annual encampment of the Whitman county G. A. R. and W. R. C. will be held in Pullman July 8, 9 and 10 and great preparations are being made by the veterans of that vicinity for the entertainment of their visitors. An invitation has been extended to the veterans of Latah and Nezperce counties in Idaho, to be present as guests of the Whitman county association. A regulation army encampment with all of the features of camp life will be maintained and it is open to all of the veterans of the civil, Spanish-American and Philippine wars. A special invitation has been extended to ex-confederate soldiers and it is anticipated that a number of them will be present. These occasions have proven very pleasant affairs in the past and the assurance goes out that Pullman people will do all in their power to make this encampment one long to be remembered. A committee of the Pullman camp and a committee of citizens have the matter in hand and are making the arrangements.

The Hazelwood Cup.

Pullman Herald: In the early part of the second semester the Hazelwood Co. of Spokane, presented to the college a handsome silver cup and pitcher to be given as a reward for proficiency in live stock work. In order that the prize might serve as a greater incentive to good all round work, Prof. Elliott decided to credit all phases of the semester's work as follows: Dairy practice, 20 points; note book, 25 points; score card practice, 15 points; butchering, 15 points; class standing, 25 points. Much interest has been manifested in the work by several members of the class and the contest has been quite close. The prize was awarded last week to V. V. Weaver with Ross Morris and G. W. Wilcox following as close seconds.
