Seeks Uniformity in Text Books.

The local board of school directors opened bids for the furnishing of text books for this district on Wednesday, but further action on the matter was postponed until after the county school board shall have decided on the books to be adopted by the county schools. The county board is making an effort to get the city schools, which are out of their jurisdiction, to adopt the same text books as those chosen by the county, thereby securing uniformity in the books used in all the schools in the county. The board is also trying to have the High schools adopt a uniform course of studies, and to this end, invitations have been sent to the principals of the several High schools, to meet at the county superintendents office tomorrow (Saturday) and discuss the matter. The county board will open bids for the furnishing of text books today.

Divine Received Sentence.

Crockett Divine was sentenced last Monday by Judge Chadwick and given \$50 and costs, which amounted to \$165.20. Divine was tried before a jury on May 23, on the charge of assault and battery upon the person of J. R. Hagaman and found guilty as charged. Just before receiving sentence, Divine asked the leniency of the court, for the reason that he had no money, and a wife and three small children were depending upon his daily work.

The court granted him a lighter sentence than would otherwise have been given. Divine will serve his time on the chain gang.

McCroskey Bros. Buy Residence.
Milton and Virgil McCroskey last week purchased the residence property of County Superintendent McCroskey on south Main street and have taken possession of same with their sister, Mrs. Browder, as housekeeper. The purchase price was \$2500, but the property is considered a bargain at that price as it is one of the most desirable in that part of the city. This sale furnishes a good illustration of the appreciation in values in Colfax in the past few years. About five years ago S. M. McCroskey purchased this property for \$1250, and while he has made no improvements, further than keeping the place up, he has doubled his money, and could have done even better on the open market.

W. O. W. Memorial Service.
Memorial services of the Woodman of the World will be held next Sunday at 2 o'clock, at the Christian church. The Rev. T. W. Matlock will deliver the memorial address. At 3 o'clock the Woodmen will march to the cemetery, where the unveiling of the monument dedicated to Emory Neal, will take place. The Knights of Pythias, of which Mr. Neal was a member, the Ladies of Woodcraft and friends are especially invited to be present.

The Fruit Prospect.
According to J. T. Woody, Whitman county's fruit inspector, who resides near Garfield, the damage done to all kinds of fruit in the county by frosts, will reach as high as 60 per cent in some sections, while 40 per cent would be a good average the county over. Of course this does not include the Snake river section. Mr. Woody says the red spider is quite general and advises the liberal use of kerosene emulsion as a remedy.
