THE PLACE TO SAVE MONEY

ABOUT THE COLLEGE.

Doors Opened for Another Term on Thursday, Sept. 21.

The Pullman, Tribune, in its issue of last week, contained the following with reference to the college:

Again the State College of Washington will open its doors for the beginning of another term, the day of opening being September 21.

The enrollment at the college last year reached the nine hundred mark and it will not be a surprise if the number will be doubled when this fall term begins, as many applications from those who are wanting to improve the advantages of this educational institution, have and are being received daily. Already the inpour of new and old students has begun, and there is good cause to believe that the attendance this year will be a record breaker.

The college faculty now numbers between sixty and seventy instructors. Part of them are engaged mostly in the investigations of the agricultural experiment station, and are specialists who have given special attention to their lines of work. The only change in the faculty is Miss M. Rowena Morse the new preceptress for Stevens Hall, elected to succeed Mrs. Van Doren who resigned last commencement. New additions to the faculty are Mr. J. L. Linklater, of Ames, Iowa, who will be instructor in animal husbandry, and Miss Davidson, of Pittsburg, Penn., a graduate of the Drexel institute, who will have charge of the work in the domestic art, having been secured by Miss Edith McDermott, who is at the head of this department.

During the vacation period many improvements have been made and are still going on. The chemical building has been further equipped, the main laboratory will now accommodate one hundred students all working at one time, and quantitative and qualitative laboratories have had their capacities materially increased, also ten new instructors have been added. Some much needed improvements have been made on the athletic grounds and in armory and gymnasium. The athletic field has been enlarged and regraded so as to give it proper drainage. Alongside of it there has been prepared a large field upon which nine tennis courts can be placed, all on the same level, separated by netting. An addition 20x40 feet has been built onto the gymnasium to accommodate the guns and ordnance of the military department, and also to provide additional dressing rooms for the athletes. There has been added one hundred new rifles for military department, and it is decided this year to organize a full cadet regiment. Captain Edward Kimmel, U. S. A., is the commandant. The room in which the plunge bath is located has been greatly improved and additional lockers have been installed. The interior of the gymnasium has received a new coat of paint. Extensive improvements have been made on the campus and about the buildings. During the summer new cement walks have been constructed to take the place

of the old wooden ones, and new driveways have also been constructed. Back of the administration building a large cement stairway, leads to a walk over the terrace towards the old college hall.

The second floor of the mechanical building is fast nearing completion, and many repairs being made on the interior of the first floor. A huge fifty foot steel smoke stack will soon be placed on the chimney, to make it higher and better the draft. The conservatory of music, situated just outside of the college grounds, will be nearly completed by the time the school opens. There are strong prospects of a large enrollment in the musical department.
