For Better Mail Service.

The United States postal department is putting forth every effort to better the service on the star routes, and to that end is limiting the bidding for mail contracts to the local people along each route.

Proposals will be received at the office of the Second Assistant Postmaster General, post-office department, until 4:30 p. m. of December 5, 1905, for carrying the mails of the United States on the routes in the state of Washington from July 1, 1906, to June 30, 1910.

No bid submitted under this advertisement will be considered unless the bidder shall agree in his bid that in the event of the service being awarded to him he will give his personal supervision to the performance of the same, and will reside on or contiguous to the route.

Notice is hereby given that The Winona Telephone Company, by and through its officers, made application to the Board of County Commissioners of Whitman County, State of Washington, on the 31st day of October, 1905, by filing their petition with the board praying for a franchise for the purpose of constructing, operating and maintaining telephone poles and wires for the use of the said The Winona Telephone Company and the general public to be served thereby, and the said Board of County Commissioners on the filing of said petition, as aforesaid, fixed the 9th day of November, 1905, at the hour of 1 o'clock p. m. of said day at the office of said Board of County Commissioners in the Whitman County Court House in the City of Colfax, Whitman County, State of Washington, as the time and place for hearing said petition; that the name of the applicant is The Winona Telephone Company, the name of the association of persons associated together for the purpose of constructing, operating and maintaining a telephone system, by and through A. L. Victor, their President, and William Lasher, their Secretary; that the roads and public highways over, along and across which the said association, The Winona Telephone Company desires a franchise, are situated and being in Whitman County, State of Washington and described as follows, to-wit:

"The H. D. Smith road, beginning at Duncan Springs on Rebel flat, the northwest quarter of sec. 30, township 17, north range 42 E. W. M., and terminating on the left bank of the Palouse river about two (2) chains above mouth of Rebel Flat Creek."

"The Greesham road, beginning on the north line of sec. 11, township 19, north range 39, E. W. M., and terminating near confluence of Rebel Flat creek and Palouse river."

"The Duncan road, beginning at a point thirty (30) feet north of the center line of the Main street in the town of Winona, in the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of sec. 20, township 17, north range 40, E. W. M., and terminating one and ninety nine hundredths (199) chains east of the northwest corner of sec. 1, township 18, north range 40, E. W. M."

"The P. Hays road, beginning at a point on the Texas ferry road where the said road leaves the west line of sec. 2, township 16, north range 40, E. W. M., and terminating at a point on the H. D. Smith road where the said road crosses the Union Pacific railroad near Winona Junction."

"The following roads connecting the town of Winona with the town of St. John, viz: The Duncan road; Henry Fisher road; the Duboise road; the James Jennings road; the C. Wilson road; and the C. D. Wilson road."

"The following roads connecting the town of Winona to Endicott, viz: The H. D. Smith road."

"The following roads connecting the towns of Winona and La Crosse, viz: The P. Hays road; the Texas ferry road, and the La Crosse change in the Texas ferry road."

"The Cooper road beginning at a point on the west bank of the Palouse river, twelve and forty eight hundredths (1248) chains west of the southwest corner of sec. 35, township 17, north range 39, E. W. M., and terminating on the Texas ferry road in sec. 36, township 17, north range 40, E. W. M."

Does It Really Pay?

Tom Lawson has done a great work—if Lawson really did it—by setting fire to the train of investigation that has exposed the entire life insurance graft. Now he wants the policy-holders of the Equitable, Mutual Life and New York Life to get together under his direction and wrest control from the present managers. That may or may not be a feasible scheme; but there are many who think it worth trying. There is one other labor that Lawson's publicity bureau might undertake that would really be worth while. Let him find out, if he can, how many policy holders are satisfied with the settlements by the companies at the maturity of their policies. There is now a general assumption that nearly all are, or have been, disappointed and dissatisfied. Is it true? And, if it is true is there good reason for it?

There are thousands and even millions of investors in life insurance who have undertaken to pay annual premiums on policies that mature ten, fifteen and twenty years in the future. Their expectations, based on the glittering talk of the agent, are, or were, high. They have many payments yet to make. What they would like to know is something definite and authoritative about the experience of persons who have been through the mill—and have survived.

A newspaper publisher in Ohio recently brought suit against forty men who would not pay their subscription and obtained judgement in each case for the amount of each claim. Of these twenty-eight made affidavit that he owned no more than the law allowed, thus preventing attachment. Then under a decision of the supreme court they were arrested for petit larceny and bound over in the sum of \$3,000 each. All but six gave bond, while the six went to jail. The new postal law makes it a larceny to take a paper and refuse to pay for it.

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NORTHWEST NEWS.

"Grandma" Bond died at Ellensburg on Tuesday at the advanced age of 97 years. She was the mother of former State Senator Jack Splawn of Yakima, and leaves four other sons, Charles, the eldest, being 76 years old. She was one of the first white women in the valley.

A new company has just been formed to build the Yellowstone Park railroad from St. Anthony, Idaho, to the western entrance to the Yellowstone national park, near Madison river, a distance of 70 miles.

George Gemmill, a 11 year old boy, was fatally shot, and Constable Sam Klein slightly wounded as the result of an attempt to hold up and rob the grocery store of Madison & Green, at 304 Fifth Avenue, Seattle, shortly after 8 o'clock Wednesday evening.

John Hildebrand, under life sentence for participation in the robbery of Mat Conway's saloon, Seattle, nearly a year ago, during which Matthew Murphey, a patron, was killed, made an attempt Wednesday afternoon to kill Jailer Wise, Jail Physician Corson, who jumped in front of the jailer, was shot over the right eye.
