BETWEEN THE OCEANS

Concise Summary of the Wired News of a Week.

Important Happenings and Things of Interest from All Over a Great Country.

Wednesday, Dec 13
Governor Chamberlain of Oregon, appointed John M. Gearin as United States senator to succeed the late John H. Mitchell.

Attorney General Moody sent a circular letter to all the United States district attorneys, 85 in number, directing them vigilantly to enforce the provisions of the Elkins act against rebates and discriminations of all kinds by carriers.

Six children of William Morgan and wife were burned to death at Lindsey, near Punxsutawney, Pa., at an early hour today. The parents and their two remaining children barely escaped with their lives.

Because the master plumbers declared for an open shop at Lorain, Ohio, three buildings were worked at midnight last night, and a carpenter who incensed the action of the plumbers was murderously assaulted.

The senate today confirmed the nominations of United States Marshal George Baker and United States District Attorney A. G. Avery of Washington and Postmaster Votaw at Tacoma. Miles Cannon, receiver, was today nominated to succeed Register Hinman of the North Yakima land office. Cannon is not a candidate, and has repeatedly declared he would not desire reappointment in May.

Thursday, December 14.
Senator Gallinger introduced an amendment to the statehood bill to prohibit the sale of liquor in the state proposed to be created by the admission of Oklahoma and Indian territory for a period of 21 years, and then only after an amendment to the state constitution permitting liquor traffic.

Dr. Hiram H. Rucker, resident physician and superintendent of the Masonic home at Decoto, Calif., was struck and killed by a train at Decoto station.

Fire broke out in St. Luke's cathedral, one of the religious edifices in Halifax, N. S., at an early hour this morning and threatens to destroy the building.

For weeks a mysterious criminal, whose methods resemble those of Jack the Ripper, has been causing a vast deal of excitement in the vicinity of Nuremberg, Germany. He would approach women in the dark streets and suddenly draw a knife and stab them. Within a few days five cases of this kind were reported to the local police.

The official register of the United States, the blue book, which is about to be issued, gives a recapitulation of the employes in the different departments, the government printing office and the offices of the District of Columbia, showing a total of 25,481 persons in the service in the city of Washington, receiving an aggregate compensation of \$27,145,700.

Friday, December 15.
Eighty-two hundred Chinese students in Tokio, Japan, incensed at the attitude of the Chinese minister to Japan, Yang Shu, in the university troubles, have resolved to return to China. Two thousand have already left.

The republican members of the house in caucus unanimously declared in favor of admitting Oklahoma and Indian Territory as one state, and by a vote of 110 to 65 declared in favor of admitting Arizona and New Mexico as one state. Both statehood questions are to be contained in one bill.

Because he attempted to land in the city pound at Reno, Nev., a pet poodle belonging to a prominent woman, D. S. Seales, the official dog catcher was pursued through the city by 40 infuriated women, armed with sticks and stones and in the possession of a rope with which they intended to hang the dog catcher. The latter finally made his escape.

The federal grand jury in Philadelphia found true bills of indictment against H. D. Wood & Co., the Great Northern Railway company, the Mutual Transit company, C. E. Campbell, freight agent of the Great Northern, L. W. Lake and Paul J. Diver of Mutual Transit com

pany, charged with giving and receiving rebates.

Saturday, December 16
One of the most daring robberies ever recorded in Portland occurred when two masked men entered the barroom of the Centennial hotel, at 481 Sherlock avenue, in North Portland, and held up the bartender and 15 men who were drinking in the place. Two men who attempted to escape the robbers were shot, one perhaps fatally.

Announcement that preparations to handle a big printers' strike have been completed by the employers of printers of New York was made by the Typothetae. The eight hour work day which the International Typographical union has decreed shall go into effect on January 1, 1906, is declared to be the cause for issuing this statement: "The closed shop and the eight hour day demanded by Typographical union No. 6 can not and will not be granted."

One thousand years in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed upon Mat Porter, convicted of cattle stealing, at Victoria, Texas. Porter is now 78 years of age, and his health is failing rapidly.

Bourke Cockrahn turned loose on the big life insurance companies in a speech today in the house of representatives.

William Guy, released from the Newburg insane asylum after 36 months confinement, and finding his wife with an 18 months' old baby, in Cleveland, Ohio, killed the baby, his wife's brother and fatally wounded a woman to whose house Mrs. Guy had fled. The latter escaped.

Sunday, December 17.
One thousand to 1500 pounds of gelignite in the thawing house of the Centre Star mine, Roseland, B. C., exploded through no known cause, killing John S. Ingram, formerly chief of police here, and injuring several scores of people. Ingram was foreman blaster, and his death removed the only possible source of information as to the cause of the explosion. His body was recovered from the debris badly mangled.

After less than a year of wedded life with her Indian husband, Chief John Blackhawk, pretty Allie Hart, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Edward Hart, has returned from Omaha to her parents, and with them left for California.

As a result of a grade crossing accident in Spokane, Miss May Burns of Hilliard was severely injured and a score of people were bruised and cut by a collision between Great Northern switch engine No. 527 and a Washington Water Power company northbound Hilliard car on the crossing at Hamilton street. The streetcar had nearly 100 people on board.

North Coast Limited express, Northern Pacific, westbound, was held up and robbed 15 miles west of North Yakima, Wash. Two masked men compelled the engineer to stop the train and run the locomotive, mail and express cars half a mile west of the balance of the train. The company declares the loss is small.

Monday, Dec. 18
Ballet dancers and chorus girls in New York have organized a union. Leaders of the proletariat agitation in Russia are being hunted down and arrested. The belief is that the "white terror" has returned and that official murders will result.

Four lives were lost in a fire which destroyed the Verbeck theater at Lorain, Ohio, early this morning.

Two hundred thousand dollars worth of furs were destroyed by fire in the establishment of Max Plasecki & Co., wholesale furriers and manufacturers of automobile garments, New York. Other tenants in the building suffered heavy damage from loss.

Fire in Chicago caused losses aggregating \$119,000 in a five story manufacturing building at 185 Lake street. The heaviest losers were Lanzown & Co., leather dealers, \$75,000.

Tuesday, December 19.
Three of the largest financial institutions in the west, the Chicago National bank, the Home Savings bank and the Equitable Trust company, all of them controlled by John R. Walsh of Chicago, and in a great measure owned by him, suspended operations today. The liabilities are \$26,000,000. Assets estimated at \$16,000,000.
