Uniontown Press: The first load of this season's crop of wheat was received on Wednesday last Friday morning. The wheat came from the Hilliard ranch on the rimrock and was threshed Thursday by the new combined harvester which was recently purchased by S. Hilliard and Jack Tady.

The first carload of new timothy hay was shipped from Uniontown to the Sound Tuesday of last week. Professor H. T. Iron, formerly of Whitman county, who has been selected as principal of the Sandpoint public schools, has bought a home in that place, paying \$2500 for it.

C. E. Isenberger has been elected assistant cashier of the Security State bank at Palouse, to succeed M. D. McPherson, who will assume the cashiership of the Bank of Potlatch. At a recent meeting of the directors of the Security State bank the capital stock was raised from \$50,000 to \$60,000.

The farm dwelling of Charles Mayer, one mile south of Colton, was destroyed by fire last Friday morning, the fire starting from a stovepipe. The house was a total loss. Everything down stairs was saved by the neighbors except some clothing. There was no insurance.

The People's Bank opened for business at Johnson Wednesday of last week. W. P. Peterson, president of the bank, came recently from Minnesota. Considerable grain around Colton that was damaged by the hot weather was cut for hay.

CALL FOR STATE CONVENTION.

A republican state convention is hereby called, to be held at Seattle, Washington, on Wednesday, September 13, 1906, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating three candidates for representative in congress and four candidates for supreme court judge, promulgating a party platform, selecting a state central committee and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention.


