#### Go Ahead, Canada!

Lord Grey, the governor general of Canada, predicted in a recent speech to an American audience that before the century closes Canada will be the dominating force on the American continent. We don't have to agree to that, not even for the sake of good feeling, but we shall not lose sleep trying to head off the calamity. An independent nation on the north of us, powerful and speaking our own tongue, will contribute to our prosperity, and we shall be glad to share prosperity with it. It is not so long ago that many people on both sides of the line believed that the time was not far off when Canada would become part of the United States. Geographically there is no barrier, and commercially our interests seem to be identical. Canada's habitable area nearly equals our own. She can raise more cereals than we can, her virgin forests are comparatively untouched and her mineral resources well nigh inexhaustible. It is natural that she should look forward to a development during the next hundred years that will rival ours and even surpass it. Lord Grey assumes that the Dominion will remain under imperial rule, as she is today, but the prospect of ultimate political union with the United States seems so good that we can contemplate without fear or jealousy the prospect of a great, powerful and prosperous Canada.

While contributions from susceptible and full pursed Americans were on their way to relieve suffering caused by famine, volcano and earthquake in the old world came a hurry call for help right at home. How generous the response to the needs of San Francisco may be inferred from action of a knot of prominent financiers who immediately telegraphed \$25,000 without waiting for subscriptions to be made. San Francisco is peculiarly the child of the whole country. About every community outside is represented there, and prosperous friend and relative will help stricken friend and relative. On the same principle San Francisco's shattered institutions and crippled industries will be lifted to their feet again.

#### Castro's Vacation.

Castro's temporary retirement "to bring harmony and good will" to Venezuela may mean that this picturesque and most disturbing factor in world politics is down and out for good. That sometimes happens when a man on a vacation lets loose of the strings which held him in place. Castro is not a normal product of conditions in Venezuela. Like so many other South American executives, he is the product of revolution, but under the constitution of the country has only a limited authority. The president of Venezuela is chosen by a council appointed by congress and, although he has large appointive powers, has no right to vote. Castro seated himself in power in the face of the organic law by the aid of adherents in the legislature and the courts. Four years ago the legal term of the executive, which is but two years, was extended for his special benefit to six years. The term for which he was chosen does not expire until February, 1908, but circumstances may cut it short, whether Castro likes it or not. If troubles keep on thickening he will probably be glad to escape with the ten millions or so of plunder he has scraped together since he took the reins in 1899. Several European capitals, to say nothing of at least one near home, will not mourn to see him go and stay.

San Francisco's plight may introduce a new principle in fire insurance or at least establish a precedent for determining the responsibility of insurance companies for losses resulting from earthquake disturbances. Earthquakes are specially named among the exemptions in the policies of many companies. But the interesting question in the case of San Francisco is the liability of companies for burned property which was left intact by the earthquake and afterward caught fire from burning ruins caused by the earthquake. Doubtless the courts will have to decide.

A writer in the London Review says that the Jews in Russia labor for the social and political elevation of the nation and actually favor the enlightenment of the very masses who are their foes. Jews who are poor fare hard in Russia, but they are too poor to leave the country. Those who are prosperous have influence in spite of the widespread antipathy to the race.

#### The Iniquitous Tontine.

In the August McClure's Burton J. Hendrick points out the fallacies, not to say the iniquities, of the Tontine form of policy that was originated and championed by Henry B. Hyde in his reckless effort to make the Equitable the largest life-insurance company in the world. Tontine (originated by Lorenzo Tonti in the seventeenth century), as Mr. Hendrick shows, in the fourth instalment of "The Story of Life Insurance" was nothing more than a huge gamble on human lives, so arranged that the rich should nearly always win (when the Equitable did not); the stake being the insurance protection of women and children. As the scheme worked, the Equitable, during its Tontine days, helped to deprive about 650 families in every 1000 that insured in Tontine, of their insurance protection. The true inwardness of the game becomes evident when it is shown that Tontine helped to build up an enormous surplus from which Hyde abstracted, under a so-called contract, 2 1/2 per cent annually. The devious methods which Hyde adopted to force his Tontine upon the public afford Mr. Hendrick the material for a most absorbing and dramatic article.

#### To Decide Boundary.

Whether Washington's state line is to be moved over until it is within 400 feet of Astoria, and whether Washington is to secure 15 miles of the Columbia river and sands now claimed by Oregon, is being contested by a boundary commission. If Washington is successful in its claims the state will receive control of fishing grounds worth millions of dollars. The testimony taken before the commission will be submitted to the supreme court. The main channel in the lower Columbia was defined in 1839 and is now ten miles south of where it was then. The Washington contention is, therefore, that by shifting of the channel toward the Oregon side, the state of Washington has legitimately gained that much more territory. The Oregon side asserts that the old channel line continues to mark the boundary between the two states, and that the only reason the channel is where it is between the two states is because the Oregonians have had enterprise enough to dredge it.

#### A Growing Sport.

From the various reports of jumping indulged in by admirers of the sport, it would appear that it is increasing in favor with the masses. We quite often read of some person jumping from the fourth, fifth or sixth story of some building to the pavement below with disastrous effects—effects from which they don't seem to ever regain their wonted pride and enthusiasm. Boardbill jumping is conceded to be the most pleasurable of all the jumps on the list. Bond jumping isn't bad, but the chances are that after making one of these you will suffer with your conscience. Claim jumping is said to be in most cases profitable, but somewhat dangerous. Neighbor jumping is possibly more generally indulged in than any of the others, but the trouble is when you enter such a contest you never know what you may be up against; but then there is the satisfaction that you can always find your record in the nearest justice court.

#### Danger From Hessian Fly.

Professor A. L. Melander, professor of entomology at the state college, has recently returned from Clarke county, where he went to investigate the Hessian fly, which is prevalent in that locality. Professor Melander says that the pest has been there longer than he is at first suspected, and that on this visit he finds that through the section of Oregon directly opposite Clarke county the pest has been observed for some years. In speaking of the situation, Professor Melander said: "I shall call President Bryan's attention to the seriousness of the situation and shall recommend that state aid be extended in stamping out this dangerous pest. Unless checked soon there is danger of its spreading over the entire wheat growing district of the state, even to the Palouse region. I regard this as one of the most dangerous and destructive pests known to the wheat grower."

#### Fire in the Timber.

The biggest fire in the history of the white pine timber belt up the Palouse occurred last week, near the town of Potlatch, and was surrounded by a large number of men and gotten under control Friday. A large tract of splendid timber land was burned over, 500,000 feet of saw logs burned up on the skids, and one large camp, with camp equipment and supplies, burned to the ground. The fire originated from sparks from an engine used in loading logs. No rain has fallen for several weeks, and the woods are very dry. The loss to the Weyerhaeuser Company will run into many thousands of dollars.
