NORTHWEST NEWS.

The committee having the matter in charge have awarded the contract for furnishing a silver service as a gift from the state of Washington to the warship of that name to Mayer Bros., jewelers of Seattle. Although the last legislature did not give any money for the purpose, Mayer Bros. will commence work at once, depending on an appropriation at the next session for remuneration. The committee will recommend that a sum not exceeding \$5000 be appropriated.

Harold Johnson, formerly Swedish Lutheran pastor at Wallace, and known as the "boy preacher of the Coeur d'Alenes," is named as correspondent in action for divorce brought by R. W. Wicklund of Wallace, against his wife. Wicklund claims Johnson broke up his home, and caused his wife to leave home and take up her residence in Minneapolis where she now is. Sensational features promise to arise in the suit.

The friends of the Stubblefield home at Walla Walla will be gratified to learn of the decision of the supreme court sustaining the validity of the bequest, valued at nearly \$200,000, by which it was founded and is sustained. Stubblefield died in 1902, bequeathing \$180,000 to provide a home for orphaned children and aged and deserving widows, at or near Walla Walla.

The Lewis and Clark centennial exposition corporation has dissolved. The capital stock was distributed last Friday and a dividend of 23 1/2 per cent on the par value of the stock, \$402,192, was declared, to be distributed among 2488 stockholders.

Four Swedish laborers working on the Culdesac extension of the Northern Pacific road were blown up on August 1 by the explosion of a delayed charge of dynamite, and their bodies buried several hundred feet down the side of the canyon. Three of the men were instantly killed and the other so badly injured that he will probably die.

The Washington Cracker company and the Inland Cracker company, two competitive Spokane concerns, after being at war for nearly three years, have declared an amnesty, raising the price of their commodities to the consumer.

Chairman Gwynn of the executive committee of the National Irrigation congress, has received notice that the passenger association has granted a rate of one fare, plus 50 cents, to the meeting of the congress in Boise, September 3-8. This rate is expected to assure even a larger crowd than had been looked for.

E. A. Gage, son of Lyman J. Gage, former secretary of the treasury, committed suicide in the Tourist hotel, in Seattle on August 2, by shooting himself through the body with a 38 caliber revolver. It is learned that Gage went on periodical spree, which weakened him greatly and made him despondent.

The crater of Mount Ranier measures 1600 feet from east to west and 1450 feet from north to south. Its depth is estimated at about 100 feet.

Only two houses remain of the business section of Spalding, Idaho, as the result of a fire Tuesday of last week. About 15 buildings were consumed. The loss is estimated at \$9000. Spalding was the first white settlement in Idaho, being settled in 1836 by Rev. Spalding, a missionary, father of the late Henry Spalding, of Almonta. He was buried only a few hundred feet from where the fire occurred. It was at Spalding where the first printing press west of the Rocky mountains was operated, when Spalding published an edition of the bible, for distribution among the Indians. The ruins of the Spalding house are on the edge of the burned area. Aside from a few Indian shacks, only three houses now remain in Spalding.

The case of Cecil Brittain, the Walla Walla boy lost in the Blue mountains, is again brought to notice by the issuing of a circular containing a picture of the child and offering a reward of \$1000 for the return of the child, alive or \$50 for the recovery of its body. Mrs. Brittain has about given up all hope of seeing her boy alive.

Articles of incorporation were filed in Walla Walla last Saturday by the Moore Automobile company. Capital stock \$25,000. The stockholders are: Gilbert Hunt, John D. Moore and Melancthon Walters, all of that city. The new company will manufacture, buy and sell automobiles and conduct a large garage.

There will probably be no official investigation at the hands of the Stevens county authorities into the Great Northern wreck near Camden on July 23. The reason for not holding an unjust is that no proper showing has been made to the officials whose duty it is to move in the matter; that the cause of deaths which occurred in the wreck is known; the engineer, upon whom the responsibility would most likely be placed by a jury, is dead; that no public benefit would result from an investigation, and the county would be put to much expense.

August 4 was the seventeenth anniversary of the great fire in Spokane. The Mazamas have been forced by the ruggedness of Mount Baker to abandon the effort to reach the summit. This decision was reached on the return of President Sholes of the club, who says that in all his experience as a mountain climber he never before has encountered such a rugged and perilous ascent as he has on the sides of Mount Baker. President Sholes and Photographer Kiser went to within 400 feet of the summit, but could go no farther because of over-hanging crags. At this place they deposited the iron box and announced that anyone reaching it would be considered a Mazama.

Miss Alice Williams of Dayton, Wash., while visiting friends in Walla Walla, called on a palmist named Chesterfield to get a forecast of her future. The professor on looking at her palm said: "You will marry a dark haired gentleman soon." "Why," he continued excitedly, "it is I!" Chesterfield went to Dayton and got the consent of the girl's parents, and the wedding took place immediately at Walla Walla.


While trying to get his dog from under a freight train standing on a Northern Pacific railway track in Spokane, Max Gady, 7 years old, was instantly killed on Sunday when a switch engine bumped into the "dead" train, moving it three feet and mangling the lad almost beyond recognition.

BURGLAR PROOF SAFES.

Patents Built of Armor Plate With Dovetailed Joints.

The introduction of harveized armor into vault construction may fairly be described as the most important single step ever taken in the development of burglar proof vaults. A vault built of armor plate, with its joints dovetailed together and keyed from the inside of the vault and provided with a circular door ground into the armor plate front, is proof against any known method of burglar attack.

After the harveized plate has been cast and forged to the necessary thickness it is covered with a coat of carbonaceous material and heated for several weeks in a furnace until the carbon, which is the hardening element in steel, has eaten down several inches into the body of the plate. The plate is then reduced to size, and the edges where they lock into each other

are machined and ground down to the dovetailed shapes shown in the engraving representing the system of joining at the corners of angles. After these points have been machined and ground to an exact fit the plates are heated and then hardened. The vaults are built with the hardened surface on the outside. The dovetails are formed with one face square and the opposite face cut at the desired angle. The clearances are so arranged that the dovetails slide snugly into place as the plates are drawn together, and after they have been brought home long, wedging strips and key pieces are driven into place from inside the vault, locking the plates securely in position. The joint as thus formed is so close and massive that it is proof against any attack by floating nitroglycerin from the outside, and wedges will make absolutely no impression upon it, the hard face splintering the wedges just as it does the hard point of a projectile. For the same reason the drill is useless, and, as for the method of attack by using the arc light and taking the temper out of the steel, it is sufficient to say that the conditions necessary for the use of the arc are so difficult to obtain that no burglar could hope to use it without detection. The banking public need lose no sleep over the electric arc scare, of which we recently heard so much.
