NORTHWEST NEWS.

It will cost the St. Paul & Milwaukee \$100,000 for right-of-way through El-lenburg alone, a distance of less than a mile. The steamer Athenian arrived at Victo-ria, B. C., Saturday from the orient with a valuable cargo, including milk valued at \$2,000,000, and sealing tin taken by Japanese schooners in Bering sea and off Copper island, valued at \$150,000. Albert M. Sheldon and other Minne-apolis capitalists have purchased one billion feet of timber on Queen Charlotte island on the Pacific coast. Official notice has been received at the Lewiston land office of the temporary withdrawal of 188,800 acres of land in the counties of Latah and Kootenai for the proposed Palouse forest reserve. So many Christmas packages were sent to Spokane that the delivery of many of them did not take place until after Christmas. The tonsorial artists of Spokane have advanced prices all along the line. Every-thing is advancing, they say, and they need the money. Cashmere wants a salmon hatchery, and there is no reason why she should not have one. Henry E. Ankeny, an Oregon pioneer and one of the best known men of the northwest, died of Bright's disease at Portland Saturday morning. Senator Levi Ankeny of Walla Walla is a step-brother of the deceased. Henry Hose, an ex soldier, was hanged at Salem, Oregon, Dec. 21, for the murder of Madge Doyle in a Portland lodg-ing house. Hose cut the woman's throat because he feared she was about to leave him. There are now approximately 8000 men employed in the various camps along the line of the Portland & Seattle road, and more are wanted. Common laborers are getting \$2.25 per day. The United States cables ship Burnside arrived at Ketchikan Monday and estab-lished telegraph communication with the outside world. A few days ago Wrangle was placed in communication, which completes the chain of cities on the southeastern coast of Alaska. An Ottawa special says the government steamer Unadira has been ordered to pa-trol the west coast of Vancouver island during the next two months for the pro-tection of life in the event of shipwrecks during the stormy season. As a result of the warm winds and rains of the past few days the Yakima river is rising rapidly and it is predicted that if the present weather conditions continue there will be another flood. The first street car service was inaugu-rated in Walla Walla Monday when cars were started. They are running at intervals of 30 minutes. Peculiar Light Giving Animals.

A peculiar light giving animal found in southern Californian waters is the heteropod. The heteropods, dazzling white and almost shapeless, can often be seen floating on the clear water. Their bodies are almost transparent, and they have in addition to a long tail a powerful sucker, by which they cling to seaweed. When these crea-tures are irritated they seem to emit a light from all over the body, though one writer describes one in which the light-red in this case—seemed to radiate from the center of the animal. Of all the light giving animals the salpa is said to be the most wonderful. Like the heteropod, this animal is provided with claspers that enable it to fasten to seaweed and rocks. So plentiful are they in Californian waters that the Santa Catalina channel, which is from eighteen to twenty miles wide and about forty-five miles long, is at times literally covered with them as far as the eye can reach. Covering the entire surface and gleaming like gems in the sunlight, they present a beautiful pic-ture. These animals constitute a deli-cacy much sought for by whales. Some of them shed a silvery light, while others yield blue and others red light.

Rivers That Flow Backward.

Near Argostoli, a town on one of the Greek islands, four little torrents of sea water, rolling on an average fifty-five gallons a second, penetrate into the fissures of the cliffs, flow rapidly inland and finally gradually disappear into the crevices of the soil. Two of these water courses are sufficiently powerful to turn all the year round the wheels of two mills constructed by an enterprising Englishman. This seems at first sight absurd on the face of it, but it is quite easily explained. The hills of the island are of soft, calcareous rock, full of fissures, and suck up water like immense sponges. In consequence the pools in their subter-ranean caverns are always lower than the surrounding sea, so to restore the balance these little brooks, fed by the waves, are always descending inland. The curious yet natural result of the constant evaporation of the sea water is that gigantic masses of salt crystals are constantly forming in the caves.—Strand Magazine.

Straw Rope Swings.

Korea is perhaps the oldest country in the world, and the customs and ac-tions that go to make up the daily life of the people are not at all governed by the logic or tradition which moves us on our enlightened way. They have no clearly regulated sports, nothing ap-parently that could be likened to a national game. They pass most of their recreation hours swinging in straw rope swings and seem entirely happy in the sport. The straw rope, if well made, is extremely durable and can stand considerable weight, as may be judged when three abeddioid young men impose their weight upon the swing, standing on the shoulders of one another after the manner of acrobats. It may be very fine pastime, but the average American, it is safe to say, would find in it very little appeal.
