GRAIN MOVING RAPIDLY

At Least 60 Per Cent Has Been Shipped.

Remainder of Old Crop Will Be Out of Way Before New Cereal Is Ready to Gather.

Grain has been flowing to tide water at a rapid rate of late from the entire Palouse. Grain men say that at least 60 per cent has been shipped, and that the remainder will go forward as soon as cars can be secured to carry it. It is thought the old crop will be removed before the new crop is ready to gather. But little buying is going on, most of the old crop having been sold or bargained for.

A few offers at 60 cents for the new crop have been made, but no actual sales are reported. This is a pointer, however, of how grain men think and feel in regard to the future. A bumper crop is looked for and the farmers are expected to reap a rich harvest in ducats as well as in grain.

INTERSCHOLASTIC FIELD MEET

Oakesdale Wins Half-Mile Relay Race--Great Enthusiasm.

The seventh annual interscholastic field and track meet at Walla Walla last week, under the auspices of Whitman College, represented by three states was largely attended. Whitman county—particularly Oakesdale—was heard from in this meet, the dispatches telling us that it remained for the sprinters of that town to throw dust in the faces of 17 of the fastest high school relay runners in the half mile relay race. Oakesdale in this race was represented by Mustard, McKenzie, Brownell, Knapp; Spokane second, Palouse third; time, 1:36 4/5.

The total points scored are as below given: Oakesdale, 29; Pendleton, 23; Baker City, 21; Spokane, 15; Lewiston, 14; Garfield, 9; Ellensburg, 7; Walla Walla, 4; Palouse and Colfax, 3; Boise, La Grande and Pomeroy, 1 each. North Yakima, Waitsburg Academy and Waitsburg High school failed to score.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

Mr. Beattie of the Washington State College addressed the students Tuesday evening on the subject of the Interscholastic track meet to be held at Pullman. Mr. Beattie is a very entertaining speaker and convinced many of the students that they could not afford to miss the event.

Miss Lola Hinchliff heard a rehearsal of the senior class play Monday night and pronounced it very humorous and entertaining. She gave some valuable criticisms which were gladly received, as the seniors are working hard to make this play a success. It is a comedy in three acts and will be delivered with all the snap and talent which can be brought out. It will be presented at the Ridgeway Theater, Friday evening, May 24.

Dr. Palamountain addressed the student body Wednesday morning, May 8, upon the subject, "The Tragedy of Medicine," which was interesting as well as instructive, and was enjoyed by all present.

Miss Greta Pattison had charge of the German classes Thursday and Friday during the absence of Miss Hoepner at Walla Walla.

The members of the senior class are working hard for their commencement exercises, which will be held at the Ridgeway, May 29. This class has shown much ability during the past four years and an interesting program is expected.

Last month, ending April 26, a hearty cheer arose in the assembly hall, when Miss Hoepner announced to the school that during that month the tardy board had remained stainless. This is the first time since the Colfax High school was opened that such a record can be recalled.

Supt. Nicholas has received the following letter from the treasurer of the committee for the presentation of a statue of George Washington to the University of Washington:

"The generous contribution of the Colfax schools has been received, and the committee wish me to express their thanks to the Board of Education, to yourself, and to the principals, teachers and pupils of the Colfax schools for their interest in the state of Washington. We congratulate you upon the patriotism shown by the board of education and the citizens of Colfax. I will be very glad to send you a separate receipt for each school if you would like them, if you have a list of the amount contributed by each school."

Walla Walla Track Meet.

Wednesday of last week the High school track team, composed of Arthur Stapleton, George Meaney, Bert Hargrave, Dan Welty, Thurston Morley, Tracey Hunton, Joe Harter, Arnold

Jamison, Burch Thompson and their coach, Mr. Person, went to Walla Walla to attend the track meet. Miss Elsie MacKenzie was the contestant in the oratorical contest. The train was crowded, there being track teams from Spokane, Oakesdale, Garfield, Palouse, Lewiston and Colfax, all in one train, not mentioning the rooters. As soon as they reached Walla Walla they were taken directly to Whitman College, where their quarters were assigned and information given concerning the program of the meet.

The preliminaries began Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Stapleton qualified in the broad jump and pole vault. Welty almost qualified in the 220 yard dash, but was injured so that he was unable to take part any longer. In the high hurdles Jamison led until next to the last hurdle, which he struck and lost the place by about six inches. Morley was counted third in the low hurdles in a heat so close that it was difficult to tell who was third and who second. Better time was made in some of the preliminaries than in some of the finals. The hundred yard dash and the mile run were the only records that did not exceed those of the Interscholastic meet at Pullman last year. In the pole vault nine men were in the contest when the bar had been raised above the point that won at the Interscholastic last year.

Of the 17 schools represented at Walla Walla, Colfax ranked 7th, with three points made by Stapleton in the pole vault at 10 feet 2 inches.

All the delegations from the Whitman County schools banded together and cheered Oakesdale in the finals. Walla Walla and Oregon supported each other. The Whitman county athletes together won 44 points—Oakesdale 29, Garfield 9, Palouse and Colfax 3 each.

In the declamatory contest many expected Miss MacKenzie to win one of the places, as she did exceedingly well.

Medals and cups were presented at a chapel meeting Friday afternoon. Each contestant received a Whitman banner.

The return trip Saturday evening was hilarious and jolly, pranks being played by every one upon every one else. Friendly rivalry was shown between the Whitman and Spokane county contestants, and everything was taken in extremely good spirits.

Pullman Track Meet.

Walter Strickler, Rolla Hill and Archie Kirkland will go to Pullman with the men who went to Walla Walla. Hill has been doing very good work in the high jump and it is hoped that he will win a place. The entries will be as follows: Dan Welty and Bert Hargrave in the hundred yard dash; Welty in 220 yard dash; Hunton and Stapleton in the 440 yard dash; Thompson in the half mile

run; Stapleton in the pole vault and broad jump; Jamison in the high hurdles; Morley in the low hurdles; Harter in the hammer throw; Welty, Morley, Hargrave and Hunton in the relay. Norman Cairns will represent us in the oratorical contest.

Special trains will be run on Friday and Saturday. Round trip tickets will be sold for one fare. The Pullman people are making strenuous efforts to entertain their guests and give them a good time. Pullman's previous record along this line makes further comment unnecessary.
