

## THE PULLMAN ELECTION

**Judge Chadwick Ordered Peremptory Writ Mandamus.**

**Clerk Must Register E. S. Burgan as Voter in Ward Two Under Ordinance No. 93.**

Late yesterday afternoon Judge Chadwick ordered a peremptory writ of mandamus to issue commanding the city clerk of Pullman to register E. S. Burgan as a voter of Ward Two as defined by Ordinance No. 93 of the city of Pullman. The ruling of the court is that the new ordinance was not published so as to become effective for this year's election. The court held the Pullman Tribune to be the official paper of the city, and the publication of the new ordinance in any other paper was unauthorized.

If the ruling of Judge Chadwick is allowed to stand the Pullman election for this year will be held under the old ward lines.

### DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

**Athenaeum Club Favored With Address by Miss McDermott.**

On Friday afternoon of last week the Athenaeum club met at the home of Mrs. W. J. Windus and listened to a most interesting talk on domestic science given by Miss McDermott, of the Washington State College at Pullman. Miss McDermott is at the head of the department of domestic science at the college and is thoroughly interested in her work, and earnestly advocates the importance of adding this department to the public school curriculum. She brought with her many samples of the work done by her classes, needlework, dress making, basketry, etc., and each piece showed excellent workmanship. There were a number of invited guests present and all enjoyed the lecture and the musical numbers which followed.

### SPINAL MENINGITIS.

**One Case Reported in Town and One at Almota.**

Two cases of spinal meningitis have come to notice this week. One is that of Will Dickey in the north end of town, who is reported by the attending physician, Dr. J. A. Balsiger, to be getting along as well as could be expected.

The second case is that of Dolph Spalding of Almota, which, at this writing, looks serious, the young man having a high fever, besides being delirious much of the time. Dr. Palamontain has charge of this case, making frequent trips to Almota.

The disease is sometimes called spot fever, and is frequently malignant in its results. The report that several cases exist in town is untrue.

### From the Land of Promise.

Miss Elizabeth Swendish, a former resident of Colfax, but for the last two years living at Juneau, Alaska, returned Saturday and will remain some time, visiting with old friends. Miss Swendish says that Alaska is in a very prosperous condition. Juneau now contains 3000 people. Douglas Island, on which is located the celebrated Treadwell mines, which includes several distinct mines under one management, is opposite, separated by a channel 2 1/2 miles wide, the two being intimately connected, commercially and socially. Flowers and vegetables of all kinds grow to perfection in this part of Alaska. Vegetables, particularly, grow quick, receiving plenty of moisture from the humid atmosphere, and are juicy and succulent. Alaska seems to be the land of promise.


