Lincoln Farm Association.

Our readers are familiar with the plan to make the Lincoln National Park one of the great patriotic memorials of our country. It includes the farm and birthplace of the immortal Lincoln. The plan is simple. It is to restore the old cabin; to clean and protect the old spring; to lay out the farm as a permanent park; to erect a noble Lincoln monument; and to establish a historical museum—in short, to make the Lincoln National Park one of the great patriotic memorials of our country.

The farm consists of 160 acres, and is located about 50 miles from Louisville, Kentucky. The Lincoln Farm Association has been formed to raise funds by popular subscription and to carry out the work contemplated. Governor Folk of Missouri is president of the association, and the membership is composed of the leading minds of the country. It is proposed to raise the necessary funds to develop the park by popular subscription, the funds being contributed in sums from 25 cents upward, and every contributor to receive a handsome Certificate of Honorary Membership in the Association, 12 1/2 x 8 inches, without liability to further dues of any kind.

It was determined that the people should have the privilege of raising this enduring monument to his memory, hence every citizen of the realm is asked to contribute a small sum, which, if all contribute, will swell it into a sum sufficient to carry out the plans contemplated.
