A new transatlantic speed record has been established. It was made last week by the giant ocean liner Mauretania. Her time was four days, 23 hours and 59 minutes, beating the fastest previous trip of the Lusitania by one minute. The Mauretania's average speed over the 2889 mile course was 25.08 knots.

The Lewiston excursion over the new Lewiston-Riparian railway on May 1 promises to be an event of great interest. The Commercial Club of Portland will send a large delegation. This branch line connects the O. R. & N. with the Clearwater Basin, and furnishes a new outlet for an extremely rich section of country. As the new line passes through a portion of Whitman county local interest, as well as pride in the work, is involved.

With the opening of spring we are again confronted with the tramp nuisance. He is returning from the sunny clime of California, where he has been a menace to society the winter long, and now comes north to live a life of uselessness. It is a crime to waste sympathy on the species. It is to be hoped the county authorities will strictly adhere to their resolution and put them to work on the roads as fast as they arrive. "Work or go hungry" is the right slogan.

The dispatches told us last week of a mother in the steerage on one of the Atlantic liners throwing her child overboard a few hours after its death, or supposed death, many of the ignorant and superstitious passengers claiming it would bring a storm, possibly shipwreck, to keep the body on board. The officers of the boat knew nothing about it until several hours after the occurrence. This is of interest insofar as showing the dense ignorance coming from Europe and peeping our shores. It is undoubtedly coming in an endless stream, and the greatest danger that confronts us as a nation is this stream of ignorance pouring in. A republic to endure depends on the intelligence of its citizenship, as each citizen has a voice in the governing power, hence we have no room for ignorance and its usual accompaniment, superstition.

A recent London dispatch says that women's hat adornments are threatened by a proposed new law against the importation of bird skins which is to be introduced in the British parliament. There has long been an agitation against the use of the plumage of rare and beautiful birds for the millinery trade, and Queen Alexandra has given it practical support by refusing to wear "ospreys" in her hats and by discountenancing their use generally. The bill which seeks to restrict the importation of the egret ("osprey"), birds of paradise and other rare kinds of plumage has been prepared under the auspices of the Selborne society, a body of naturalists and bird lovers. Queen Alexandra is a queen indeed. This is not the first time she has shown herself to be a woman in the truest sense of the word as well as a queen. As the English enforce their laws we may look for results.

The editor of the Pullman News is sorely perplexed; in fact, the whole W. S. C. faculty is nonplussed over the arrival at the experiment station in that burg of a consignment of prune juice that will not ferment. It came from the Blalock fruit orchard at Walla Walla, with a note appended that the Walla Walla concern had tons of this unfermentable prune juice and asking why was all this thusly. The faculty was asked to explain the phenomenon. It should be explained, if it takes tons of juice and time to solve the mystery. Says the News: "It would seem that several tons of unfermented prune juice in Pullman at the present time would do much to answer the ever recurring question in minds of thirsting men; that it would tide them over from the now defunct opportunities of surfeit and plenty, on through the tapering off stages of involuntary temperance, and at last into blissful recognition to things unfermentable."

**A Hard Nut to Crack.**

The friends of Mr. Bryan express confidence that he can be elected president if nominated. That they should so express themselves is quite natural, and is in keeping with the rule adopted by politicians in elections in general. Mr. Bryan and his friends have been equally confident in preceding campaigns, with what result all readers know. To our way of thinking the New York World, democratic, hits the nail on the head when it asks Mr. Bryan the question: "What state do you expect to carry now that you failed to carry in 1900, or Mr. Parker failed to carry in 1904?" That is a pertinent question, one that has not been answered, and so far as Mr. Bryan is concerned, has never attempted to answer. There is nothing in the political sky to show that the democracy can carry a single state they did not carry at the last two presidential elections. Bryan or any other candidate, of course, will carry the south. The new state of Oklahoma, it is conceded, will go democratic—the only addition they can positively count on. New York and the New England states will give Bryan lukewarm support. They are surely republican. Nebraska, Minnesota, Colorado offer no hope for democracy. Missouri cast its electoral vote for Roosevelt at the last election, but is a state that may be placed in the doubtful column at this time, the result there depending a great deal on the senatorial fight between "Gumshoe" Stone and Governor Folk. Kentucky can be counted for the republican candidate. Some claim to see doubts of Montana and Idaho standing firm in the faith of republicanism. Such doubts are not warranted by visible signs, but by events so remote as to cause little or no concern. From the viewpoint of the candid observer the question propounded by the World is one that has not, and cannot be satisfactorily answered. "What state do you expect to carry now that you failed to carry in 1900, or Mr. Parker failed to carry in 1904?" is a question for democrats to ponder over.

**It Should Be Investigated.**

The following paid reader appears in a Pullman paper: "Port Simpson is the terminus of the Hudson Bay-Pacific Railway, which taps the rich oil fields of Athabasca. The town is destined to be one of the largest cities on the Pacific coast. Further information," etc. In the first place, the Hudson Bay-Pacific Railway exists wholly on paper if it has any existence whatever. In the second place, Port Simpson was expected to be the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific, now building across the continent, but when the officials of that road got ready to locate their Pacific coast terminus they found everything in and around Port Simpson gobbled up by speculators, anticipating the arrival of the road at that point and expecting to reap a rich harvest. Railroad companies, as a rule, select a terminus to make all there is in it themselves, and as the Grand Trunk Pacific has proved itself to be the biggest hog yet crossing the continent, they gave Port Simpson the go by and selected Prince Rupert, 40 or 50 miles south of Port Simpson, as their western terminus. There, undoubtedly, of the same relative importance as Vancouver, the western terminus of the Canadian Pacific, a city will spring into existence; in fact, the town has been platted, although lots have not been placed on the market. The speculators at Port Simpson are now evidently anxious to unload. Intending investors should not bite too readily. In these days of fake townsite and land schemes people should never invest anywhere, under any circumstances, without first giving the matter a thorough and personal investigation.

**POTTERY, BRICK AND TILE.**

**Company Will Operate Two Plants at City of Palouse.**

According to the Republic, a large plant will be built at Palouse for the manufacture of all classes of ware and another for the manufacture of brick and tile. Spokane and Portland people, who are experts in the manufacture of clay products, are among the stockholders in the new concern. This means a healthy industry for Palouse. "The superiority of the Palouse clay is proven from the fact that coast potteries are having clay shipped from here to mix with the clay near at hand to enable them to manufacture ware that is salable," says the Republic. "One concern at Seattle has for some time been using one ton of Palouse clay with six tons of its local clay in the manufacture of all its ware. An order has just been received for 20 cars of clay to be shipped to the coast from here."
