**DEATH OF MRS. KINNEAR.**

Follows Close After Death of Her Husband.

Word was received in Colfax that Mrs. E. M. Kinnear, relict of the late E. M. Kinnear, had died Wednesday evening at 5:30 o'clock at Santa Cruz, California, where she went several weeks ago for her health. Her husband died December 23 of last year, since which time she has been in ill health. Mrs. Kinnear was about 50 years old, and was born in Eugene, Oregon.

The remains will arrive in Spokane Monday morning and the funeral will take place Tuesday. Mrs. Kinnear is survived by two children—Miss Mabel Kinnear and W. E. Kinnear. Mrs. Howard Bramwell of Colfax and Mrs. W. C. Fudge of Coeur d'Alene are nieces. Several brothers also survive.

The Kinnears lived in Colfax for several years, when Mr. Kinnear was engaged in mercantile pursuits. They afterwards lived in Roseland, B. C., but of late years have made their home in Spokane.

**Aged Minister Ill.**

Mrs. John Pattison and James and J. W. Cairns left Sunday for Seattle, where they were summoned to the bedside of their father, Rev. James Cairns, who is seriously ill. A letter received Wednesday by relatives here brings word that Mr. Cairns has rallied somewhat, his condition being less serious than when the telegram was sent. His improved condition is attributed in some measure to the presence of his daughter and sons, and his physicians think he may have further improvement. Mr. Cairns suffers from no organic disease, his weakened condition resulting from the infirmities of age. He will celebrate his 85th birthday this week.

**Pioneer Passes Away.**

Another pioneer has gone to that bourne from whence no traveler returns. It is Hugh P. Barr, who came to Colfax in 1877 and lived here until a year ago, when he moved to La Crosse.
