The board of equalization, consisting of the members of the board of county commissioners, the county treasurer and the county assessor, were duly sworn and Milton P. McCroskey, county treasurer, was elected chairman of the same.

An appropriation, in the sum of \$300.00, was made for the current expense of the county auditor's office.

G. B. Carter, sheriff, having filed the appointment of Wm. Cole, as deputy in his office, the same was duly approved.

H. E. Ash of Colfax, was granted an auctioneer's license.

The report of R. A. Cox, superintendent of the poor farm, showing the expense for the month of July to be \$211.45, was approved by the board.

N. Sims, deputy county engineer, filed a report showing the progress on the various steel bridges being erected in the county.

An order was made fixing the salaries of the respective deputies in the sheriff's office.

Walter Griffith, of Oakesdale, was appointed to the free school township at Washington State College for the ensuing year.

W. W. Reid tendered his resignation as justice of the peace of precinct No 34, which was duly accepted.

The application of J. D. Ellis, asking to have the taxes cancelled on the improvements formerly situated on a Colfax tract, said improvements consisting of a barn which was wrecked by a landslide in February, 1909. The application was granted for the 1909 taxes.

The auditor's certified list of salaries for the month of July, 1909, was duly approved.

An order for examination was made of the books of George W. Jerguson, 1909. The application was granted for the 1909 taxes.

The petition of John Peterson and others for the Jones and Peterson road was rejected.

The board of county commissioners adjourned to meet August 16, 1909.
