

WHITMAN COUNTY JURY LIST

Names Drawn Under New Law by the County Clerk.

The following names have been drawn for jury service at the term of court beginning November 1. Under the law passed by the last legislature jury commissioners for selecting names for jury duty have been abolished thus lessening one expense to the county. The county clerk now selects and draws the names. County Clerk Newman selected all names in the county subject to jury duty. These include taxpayers and voters only. A large tin revolving box, divided into three compartments, numbered 1, 2 and 3, hold these names. The county is also divided into three districts, as nearly as possible as the commissioners' districts are divided, the names desired for jury duty being taken equally from each compartment of the box, thus distributing the burden of jury duty, if it is a burden, upon the shoulders of every part of the county. A jurymen having served once his name cannot be drawn again for five years. The drawing of names from the box, as stated above, is done by the clerk in the presence of the superior judge. It will thus be seen that everything is fair and equitable, besides avoiding extra expense to the county. Following are the names drawn:

FREIGHTS TO EUROPE.

Ship Owners Benefited at Expense of Grain Growers.

At a meeting of the Merchant Marine League of Seattle the other day it was announced that they had been able, on a showing made of the damage done to coast shipping by foreign vessels bringing out coal from the Atlantic for the navy, to have it arranged with the secretary of the navy that in future all such vessels would have to return to their original landing port in ballast, so as not to conflict with the traffic of coast vessels.

The facts are, it is alleged, that with the exception of one or two steamers, which loaded lumber to the Orient, and in so doing benefited the lumber trade, all these steamers have been engaged to carry wheat to Europe, a business that none of the coast vessels engage in, and had it not been for the presence of these same coal vessels in the market it is safe to say that freights to Europe would have been at least \$1 per ton more than they have ruled so far this season. This would have meant 3 cents per bushel to every farmer who marketed his wheat. So far this season 14 foreign steamers, of a capacity of 80,000 tons or about 2,500,000 bushels, have been taken to carry wheat.

The question is, therefore, are grain growers, upon whom the burden would fall, to be held up to this extent for the benefit of a very limited number of individuals who happen to be interested in the shipping business? It is a matter that farmers' organizations might look into with profit to themselves.

RECLAIM COLVILLE VALLEY.

Drainage Bonds Sold and Reclamation Work Soon to Begin.

John H. Ellis, who was in Stevens county last week, looking particularly at the Colville valley, returned home Saturday. The Colville valley has long been known as one of the garden spots of the state. To make its productivity complete, however, the center of the valley, along which the Colville river flows, is low lying and needs reclaiming. When this is done it will add several thousand acres of alluvial soil for cultivation. Several attempts have been made to get the government interested in the matter of reclamation, but the government has so many projects on hand that this has been deferred. The citizens of the valley have taken hold of the matter, have divided the work into districts, each district issuing bonds to pay for the work done within its territory. The cost of the work at Valley, for instance, where Mr. Ellis spent most of his time, will be \$80,000.

Bids were opened at Chewelah Saturday for the purchase of \$76,000 bonds

of the drainage district which is to drain the Colville valley. The bids were sold to Foley & Gleason of Minneapolis for six per cent. The bonds are to run 10 years with the privilege of paying in five years. The only other bidder was the Exchange National Bank of Spokane, which bid seven per cent interest.

This work shows enterprise on the part of the citizenship of that county, which will surely bear fruit of a substantial nature. No county in the state produces more luscious fruit, the hay lands of the Colville valley are famous, the timber areas are extensive and mining is a big industry.

Mr. Ellis was greatly pleased with what he saw.
