In the building of stairways and ladders there is a simple little rule that is of general application and makes the most comfortable and practicable affair to climb. It is: 2 x the riser + the tread = 24 to 25 inches. For a ladder this gives a vertical distance between rungs of one foot, and the rule is based on the common sense principle that it is more than twice as hard to lift as it is to go on the level, but there is less of it to do. In a power plant the stairs should be straight in order to permit of handling long lengths of pipe, etc. In regard to width, two feet nine inches is about the minimum, but the stairs are sometimes cut a little narrower. Where room is available it is better to make the stairs five feet wide, which gives plenty of room for two to pass without crowding.—Power. Lord to Captain Red Sox. Harry Lord, third baseman, who was the first of the Boston American players to sign for next season, has been appointed captain by Manager Pat Donovan. Lord was the leader of the Red Sox in 1909 after Doc Gessler was released to Washington. Harry is a magnetic player, and it is the general opinion of the fans that if he had been captain of the team all during the 1909 campaign the Red Sox would have finished at least second and might possibly have won the pennant. Tuning Forks. The tuning fork was the invention of John Stone, royal trumpeter, in 1811. Though the pitch of forks varies slightly with changes of the temperature or by rust, they are the most accurate means of determining pitch. Tuning forks are capable of being made of any pitch within certain limits, but those commonly used are the notes A and C, giving the sounds represented by the second and third spaces in the treble staff. HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST CONDENSED FOR READERS A recommendation that Japan be given the minimum rate under the new tariff law will be made by President Taft. Whether the Hawaiian Islands shall be "dry" will be left to the Hawaiian people themselves and will not be determined by Congress. The case of the late Lieutenant Jas. H. Sutton, of the Marine Corps, the Portland boy who met death at the Naval Academy in 1907, will not be reopened. Partial arrangements have been made by Senator Bourne to have a geologist from the geological survey examine the oil deposits of Oregon next year. W. J. Bryan has come out flat-footed for county option, and declares Democracy must divorce itself from the liquor interests, because an alliance with the saloon can generally be regarded as an alliance with vice. The Pacific Navigation Company's steamer Lima is ashore on one of the islands in the Huambin passage of the straits of Magellan, and probably will be a total loss. The chief pilot and 50 passengers were drowned. Impairment of the efficiency of the organized militia by the use of armories in certain states for non-military purposes is charged in advices on the subject received by the War Department. The French Antarctic expedition under Dr. Jean M. Charcot has reached latitude 70 degrees south, longitude 126 degrees west and discovered 120 miles of new land to the west and south of Alexander Island. Charges that certain of the "insiders" in the Wells-Fargo Express Company, knowing in advance that the 300 per cent "melon" would be cut, had tricked stockholders out of their holdings, will be laid before the Interstate Commerce commission. The directors of the Pullman Company decided at a special meeting to give the stockholders a stock dividend of 20 per cent on the corporation's \$100,000,000 of capital. This will call for the issuance of \$20,000,000 of new capital, worth nearly \$40,000,000 in the open market. Believing that certain rays of the X-ray machine may cure leprosy, Dr. George H. Printing a Coin on Linen. The print of a silver coin or medal may be made on silk or linen by dipping the fabric in a solution of nitrate of silver and stretching it over the face of the coin until the image is imprinted. The linen is sensitized by dipping it into a solution of nitrate of silver, made by dissolving sixty or eighty grains of nitrate of silver in one ounce of water. Wet the portion of the cloth which is to receive the impression in the solution and when nearly dry draw it over the face of the coin and tie it at the back. Expose to a weak light, and in a few minutes the raised design of the coin will appear on the linen. As soon as the print is dark enough remove and wash in clear water. When nearly dry iron it smooth with a warm iron, placing a piece of tissue paper over the print. In printing from the coin or medal it is advisable to paste a piece of paper on the reverse side, so that the silver will not come in contact with the sensitized fabric.
