ONCLE SAM'S MAILS.

Some of the Eccentricities Encountered Nearly Every Day.

There are sometimes funny things connected with Uncle Sam's postoffice department. Considering the size of the institution and the amount of business done it is conducted along lines approaching reasonable perfection.

On the 15th of May two letters were received at this office, one from Seattle the other from Irondale, both bearing date March 15. They were two months to a day reaching their destination, when they should have come in two days.

They also bore the postscript on the back of Chicago, May 13, showing that they had crossed and recrossed the continent. It developed later that other letters were received here at the same time under like dates and conditions.

The presumption is that a mail sack containing these letters was in some one of the many railroad wrecks in the Cascade mountains of that period and, when dug out, got started in the wrong direction, going to Chicago, but the letters finally reached their destination. Such delays are seldom noted and loss of mail seldom occurs.

Another funny thing in connection with the postoffice happened a few months ago. A letter was sent to a Colfax citizen from Seattle, bearing the inscription "Colfax, Washington, D. C." From Seattle the letter went direct to Washington, D. C.; from there it was forwarded to Colfax, Montana; from thence it was sent to Colfax, California; from the latter place to its correct destination. It had crossed and recrossed the continent, besides making a long detour south, but finally got here all right.

Considering the many absurd directions on envelopes, as well as poor penmanship, Uncle Sam's postoffice employees do good work.

NEW ADDITION TO COLFAX

Will Be Placed on the Market Next Week.


