THE ELBERTON PICNIC.

Program of Exercises Outlined for the Big Event.

That the management of the Elberton Picnic intends to have something doing all the time is shown by the program which, for the first day, includes the program prepared by the Colfax people at 10 o'clock, band concert at 12:30, refined free vaudeville at 1 o'clock, baseball at 2:30 between Colfax and Winona, and, after the ball game, there will be the ball throwing contest, egg race, men's relay race and fat man's race.

In the evening there will be a band concert and vaudeville acts. The dancing pavilion will be open every afternoon and evening.

The second day, immediately after the declamation contest, there will be a ball game between Steptoe and Elberton, which will be free. Vaudeville acts and band concert will follow.

Farmington and St. John will meet on the diamond at 2:30 and, after the game, the potato race, sack race, free for all foot race of 100 yards, boys' race 16 years and under will be pulled off. Good prizes will be offered for all the races.

The usual band concert and vaudeville acts will be put on the third day, which will be Farmers' Union Day, and after the game between the winners of the two previous games another relay race will be run, after which will come the pulling contest. There will be two classes, one for teams in the 2600 class and one free for all.

An excursion train will be run from Colfax the first day and in all probability one from Tekoa and Farmington the second day.

The Winona people are enthusing and will send their band of 18 pieces with their ball team on Wednesday.

Music for the dance will be furnished by Carey's band of Moscow. Mr. Carey is instructor of the cornet and cadet band at the University of Idaho. The manager of the Elberton Picnic will have an office on the grounds, and it will be appreciated if those desiring to enter the various contests would file their entries before the ball game.

Moving Picture as an Educator.

The moving picture is now applied to educational purposes, says the Scientific American. Chemical tests are now exhibited on the screen. There are films illustrating the electrolysis of water, action of nitric acid on silver and action of aqua regia on metallic gold, etc. The test tube is thrown on the screen many times enlarged, and the chemical action is clearly illustrated. Most unsavory, but educational, is a film illustrating the peril of the fly. The flies are shown laying eggs in unsavory places, and before the eyes of the spectators the eggs develop in heaps of wriggling maggots. In the final stage the winged fly is shown in all its insanitary glory. Still another film exhibits the acrobatic fly lying on its back juggling various articles with its feet and even swinging a dumb-bell as large as the insect itself.

Pneumonia Cured by Serum.

A record of six cases of pneumonia ordinarily fatal, in which, after a treatment of inoculation with a vaccine of killed pneumococci, there was a complete recovery, is announced by Dr. Henry A. Craig, assistant physician at the Sailor's Snug Harbor hospital, New Brighton, N. Y., in the Medical Record.

In these cases the ages of the patients were from sixty-six to eighty-seven years, and, as is well known, pneumonia is fatal in almost all cases at that age. What is perhaps more important is that all the patients had a marked alcoholic history, and all showed marked arterio-sclerosis.
