FIGHTING WEED PESTS.

State College Issues Bulletins on Well Known Pests.

Tumbling Mustard.
This weed is popularly called in eastern Washington the "Jim Hill" mustard. It is properly known as the Tumbling mustard. It is an annual, that is, it goes to seed each year and dies to the ground. The plant grows to an extremely large size, making a real tumble weed. It bears a large number of seeds, which are oily and therefore live a long while in the soil. The best way to fight this weed is to go onto the land in the fall and disk it lightly, thus covering the seeds just enough to make them sprout. Do not plow, as this will bury the seeds to such a depth that most of them will not grow promptly, but will lie in the ground for years, and as they are brought up by each successive year's plowing will fill the field with weeds. If the land is lightly disked, the fall rains will usually cause the seed to sprout. If the land should dry off enough, the sprouted weeds may be killed by disking or harrowing, or any sort of weedkilling cultivation, during the winter. But if, as is more probable, the land is too moist to cultivate in the winter, go on the land in the spring as late as possible with a weed-killer and kill the young weeds. After this the land may be plowed and planted to some late spring crop such as barley or oats, or it may be

summer fallowed. The greatest danger is in burying the seeds. Otherwise, the weed is not hard to kill.

Russian Thistle.
The Russian thistle is not a true thistle, but is a tumble weed. It entered the state about 15 years ago and has not been very rapidly distributed. It, however, occurs in some places on the summer fallow and in other places to a considerable extent in waste land. In a few cases it is making trouble in wheat fields.

The Russian thistle is an annual, that is, it goes to seed each year and then dies down. Fortunately, it makes its flowers and seed late in the summer after the grain crop has been removed. It should be prevented from going to seed by being cut off after the grain has been taken off. If it is allowed to go to seed by being cut after the grain has been taken off. If it is allowed to go to seed, the piles of weeds should be burned and the young weeds killed by clean cultivation.

Live stock, especially sheep, eat the weed freely while it is young and thrive well on it.


