### More Idaho Warehouses.

The farmers of the Culdesac section have fallen into line with the rest of the Camas and Nez Perce prairie farming districts and will invade the field in competition with the live grain buying and storage companies. There has been filed with County Auditor Gifford articles of incorporation of the Culdesac Farmers' Warehouse company, capitalized at \$10,000, in which the stockholders are S. C. Cose, D. A. Wright, Patrick Scully, A. L. Hauley, W. H. Bundy, D. R., Barnes, Theodore Dufour, J. S. Scholl, Luther and J. R. Nolen.

The life of the incorporation is 50 years and the articles state that the purpose is to deal in all kinds of live stock and farm produce; lease, purchase, construct and operate electric, water power, and steam plants and flour mills and to carry on a general warehouse and storage business.

The company formed at Culdesac completes a continuous chain of farmers' warehouses from Lewiston to Grangeville, companies which have secured warehouses having been formed in the last 60 days at Granville, Fenn, Cottonwood, Vollmer and Nez Perce.

The farmers at Peck recently purchased the Lin Magill warehouses and are preparing to buy or build at other points along the Clearwater branch of the Northern Pacific.
