

March 6.—The Dunbar Company, Male Quartet and Bell Ringers.


May 6—Senator Dolliver, "A Poor Man's Government, and a Poor Boy's country."

So-Called Multi-Millionaire Proved Rank Fakir—Worked Smooth Game in Tekoa.


