PRESIDENT BRYAN'S YEAR'S LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

Every hard worker owes himself a holiday now and then, for "all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." The laborer is worthy of his hire. When such a worker in the vineyard of teaching as President Bryan of Washington State College is given a year's leave of absence after nearly eighteen years of unbroken service the hire is worthy of the laborer.

His hard work in building up this great and useful institution has not made him dull, but it has taxed his health heavily. Last spring President Bryan tried to resign, but the students, graduates and faculty of the college and the citizens of Pullman knew his value too well to accept the attempted resignation. The regents voluntarily offered him a leave of absence, and the loss to the institution and the state was prevented.

Such a record as President Bryan's is an honor to all. It reflects credit on the man, the institution and the commonwealth. President Schurman of Cornell is the only president of a land grant college in the United States whose service excels Mr. Bryan's in length. None exceeds it in value. It emphasizes the wisdom of finding the right man for a job and then holding fast to him. It may confidently be anticipated that the head of this state's agricultural college will pick up some "wrinkles" from the European ones—and also give them helpful "pointers."

ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

With the coming of spring the matter of road improvement has taken a firm hold upon the farmers and citizens as well. While the roads in the vicinity of Pullman are in a fair condition considering the time of year, a little dragging of the public highways by the farmers would work wonders in the way of improving the roads for travel. The people of Ewartsville district are planning to put on five drags in that neighborhood, to be operated by the farmers and the construction of the drags to be paid for by the farmers and Chamber of Commerce, the county having offered to furnish the timber for same. It is estimated that these drags can be built for between \$3 and \$5 each, and if each farmer in the county follow the example of the Ewartsville people and drag the road from his own gate to that of his neighbor, the highways would be wonderfully improved. It could be so arranged that the work would be all done the same day and all the roads of the county would be dry and in good condition at the same time.

In the next issue of this paper will be published an article by President F. M. Slagle of the Chamber of Commerce, on road improvement, which will be interesting both from the point of view of farmers and the townspeople.
