MANY CASH PRIZES AT LIVE STOCK SHOW

Stock Judging Contest for Boys and Girls Will Be a Special Feature

Cash prizes aggregating \$9000, as well as many special prizes, are included in the premium lists of the Northwest Livestock Show, which will be held at Lewiston December 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13. Among the prizes listed are \$2250 for the best carload exhibits; \$500 for sweepstake premiums; \$200 for the students' judging contest, and \$150 (also two pure bred hogs) for the boys' and girls' contest in stock judging. For the "community four-horse team contest" four gold watches are offered. One hundred dollars is offered for the best short course judging team.

The stock judging contest for boys and girls will include horses, beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, and sheep—five classes. For first place in each class \$20 is offered, giving one boy or girl an opportunity to win in one or three, or even five classes, thus receiving \$100 in cash. The boy who earns the highest number of points in all five classes will receive, in addition to cash prizes won, a pure bred pig. Likewise, the girl earning the highest points in all five classes will receive a pig. The idea is to give a large number of boys and girls a chance to compete and win a prize, for it is unlikely that one boy could win in all five classes, though if his judgment is good enough he could do so. Any boy or girl winning first in two of the five classes will stand an excellent chance to win the bonus pig.

On Monday and Tuesday (December 9 and 10) the live stock association will meet in sessions which will be addressed by men prominent in the live stock industries from Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, and British Columbia. Mr. William McGivney, president of the South St. Paul Stock Yards, has been invited to address the sessions if he is west at that time, as he may be.

The Saloonless Kansas

A state that has no saloons constantly challenges attention, and statistics concerning her community welfare are always interesting. The attorney general of Kansas has recently summed up the effect of 30 years of prohibition on the state. He finds that a third of the entire population is enrolled in school and that illiteracy has been reduced from 49 per cent to less than 2 per cent, and that small amount is almost entirely among the foreign element.

There are no insane in 87 of the 105 counties of the state; in 54 there are no feeble minded, and in 96 there are no inebriates. Thirty-eight of the county poor farms have no inmates, and there is only one pauper to every 3000 population. At one time last year 53 county jails were empty and 65 counties had no prisoners serving sentences. Some counties have not called a jury for criminal trial in 10 years.

Whether all these things are due entirely to prohibition can not be determined, but it is a statistical fact that the consumption of liquor has been reduced from \$29.60 per Kansas to \$1.48.

Prohibition may not be responsible for this near-millennium, but it is the only outstanding fact to which the condition may be attributed and certainly indicates that prohibition ought to present an irresistible temptation to other communities.
