

# LECTURE BY FAMOUS INDIAN PHOTOGRAPHER MONDAY NIGHT

Edward Curtiss Comes with Illustrated Lecture on Indian Life—Special Orchestra will Play Indian Music

Monday night, December 9th, at 8 p. m., in the college auditorium, the celebrated Edward S. Curtiss will appear in his famous "Indian Picture Opera."

While Mr. Curtiss is a Seattle man this trip is his first appearance in opera on the Pacific coast. Much notice of his coming has been made. Seats at the various theatres in Seattle, Portland and Spokane have been reserved for the past forty days. So great has been the demand for him in this production that it has been impossible to fill the dates. In this respect, the "Picture Opera" has aroused nation wide interest.

The reason that Edward S. Curtiss attracts the people is because he comes with a message. In his art, he is master. The Indians have too long been misunderstood. Curtiss long ago divined that the only way to portray them was to show them by the way of heart and sympathies. Since boyhood this has been an extremely fascinating study to him. Feeling that perhaps another generation would be too late to make their acquaintance he girded himself with the determination to make the Indian a life study. He went unto them to live, study and be a brother, and now brings back the great secret to the American people.

Julian Hawthorn in a review of Curtiss' "North American Indian," says well of him, "he went to the Indians, not as a critic or a patron, not as seeking entertainment nor to gratify profligate curiosity; he went as man to brother man, and for the sake of mankind. He went warmly and kindly with straight looks and honest purpose, without fear and without guile."

"Conceding that they were strange he would not admit that they were alien; he sat in their wigwams and beside their fires, not as a suppliant nor as a master, but as an equal. He made no secret of his intent. He would penetrate, if he might, to the very heart and soul of them; and he would record what he found in imperishable forms. They were doomed to perish from the earth, their old men and their young men, their women and their children; yet, in his story of them they should still live on; and, perhaps, ages hence, they would receive justice and understanding from the posterity of those who had fought and destroyed them, but understood them not. Curtiss, who stands second to no artist with the camera, pursued his mission east and west, from Alaska to the Mexican border; and his achievements in his pictorial direction alone are, for number, comprehensiveness, aesthetic beauty, and sterling truth, superior to any other ethnological collection. Such were Curtiss' dealings with the Indians; and to his own countrymen, and to civilized Europe, that he offers the result in a form so splendid that literary and artistic analysts fail to show its parallel."

The final score of the Thanksgiving contest, 19 to 0 in favor of the University, may give persons who did not see the game the idea that the State College lads were overwhelmed. But that is far from being the case. Every man on the team put up a splendid fight. The University team made many lucky plays and really earned but one touchdown. This was their first touchdown, being made soon after the game began by steadily forcing the visiting team back over their goal line. After this the W. S. C. team got together in better shape and the University team found it hard to make any great gains. Several strokes of good fortune enabled the "clam diggers" to get close enough to the W. S. C. goal line in the second quarter to allow their versatile quarter, Bud Young, the pleasure of making two drop kicks. The remaining touch-

down came after bad luck had taken another fling at the vanquished ones not long before the end of the game. Goff was forced to punt from W. S. C.'s 15 yard line and Griffiths succeeded in blocking the punt. Bliss fell on the ball on the eight-yard line and the U. team carried it over after two hard attempts.
