

# HIGH SCHOOL BOYS PLAYED GREAT GAME

Overwhelmed Old Colfax Rivals and  
Rolled Up a Score of 40 to 0 in  
Annual Football Contest

The Pullman high school football players again demonstrated their supremacy among the county school teams last Saturday by rolling up a score of 40 to 0 against the heavy Colfax aggregation. The visitors outweighed the locals over 12 pounds to the man, but what the Pullman players lacked in weight they more than made up in speed and aggressiveness. At no stage of the game was Pullman's goal in danger, and while the sturdy Colfax squad played gamely, they could neither stop the plunging of the Pullman backs nor solve Coach Eyre's open plays.

The Pullman line, which was supposed to be weak on account of the lightheadedness and inexperience of the players, showed up splendidly, repeatedly spilling the plunges of the Colfax backs and holding them for downs. Price, at end, and Weeks, at tackle, did especially good work, the latter making several big gains and proving himself hard to stop on tackle around runs.

A large crowd of rooters came up from the county seat and gave loyal support to their team, even after it had become apparent that Colfax was outclassed. As usual, a feature of the contest was the enthusiastic cheering and excellent singing of the Pullman high school girls and boys, who never let up for a minute in their efforts to encourage their champions. The victory virtually gives Pullman the county championship for the fourth consecutive year, as Colfax was the only dangerous competitor for the honor.

The game in detail was as follows:

First quarter—Colfax kicked off and F. Glover muffed the ball but recovered it and made a good gain. Pullman started a series of fierce line bucks and was carrying the pigskin rapidly down the field when F. Glover fumbled on a pass and a Colfax player dropped on the ball. Colfax made yardage once, but was then held and Lommasson punted. F. Glover again fumbled and Colfax recovered the ball. The Pullman line held like a stone wall and Lommasson was forced to punt. The ball went out of bounds on Pullman's 30-yard line. The Pullman backs made 20 yards by line plunges and then Captain Henry got away for 30 yards on a play through left tackle, with the ball on Colfax's four-yard line. Glenn Glover made a touchdown on a line buck. Henry kicked goal. Pullman kicked off and Lommasson ran the ball back 10 yards. Failing to make yardage through the line, Lommasson punted and the quarter ended with the ball on Pullman's 25-yard line.

Second quarter—When the teams lined up again Hooper had taken Stookey's place as right guard and Colfax had substituted Frazier for Spaeck at left end. The Pullman backs carried the ball 65 yards down the field in 12 line bucks and Henry took it over for a touchdown on a 10-yard run around right end. He missed kicking goal by inches. Pullman kicked off to Lommasson, who received the ball on the bound and ran it back 10 yards. Colfax made yardage on two line plunges and then lost the ball on downs. Pullman made 10 yards on two line bucks and punted to Colfax's 20-yard line. Colfax fumbled and Price dropped on the ball on the 15-yard line. The Pullman backs made 10 yards in two tries and Moss scored a touchdown on a quarterback run. Henry kicked goal. Pullman kicked off and Goff ran the ball back eight yards before he was downed. The half ended with the ball in the center of the field.

Third quarter—Klossner took Henry's place at guard for Pullman and Colfax made no changes. Pullman kicked off to Lommasson, who made 10 yards before he was tackled. Colfax tried a forward pass, which failed. Frozier hurt his weak knee and Coach Cool sent in Spaeck to take his place. Lommasson gained 10 yards from a fake punt formation and then tried another forward pass, which went wild. Lommasson punted to Glen Glover, who ran the ball back 10 yards. Pullman made 10 yards on three line plunges and negotiated 20 more on a forward pass to Price. Fred Glover tore off 15 yards, but Pullman was penalized 15 yards for holding. A forward pass was intercepted by Colfax on their 20-yard line. During the next few minutes the Colfax boys showed up better than at any stage of the game. After making yardage on line plunges they failed on a forward pass and were penalized five yards for being offside. They gained 15 yards on a forward pass to Colvin and Lommasson added 10 more on a fierce

line buck. The ball went to Pullman on their 35-yard line just as the quarter ended.

Fourth quarter—Fred Glover gained 15 yards on a line plunge and Glenn Glover, aided by excellent interference, dodged his way across the goal line, after a run of 45 yards. Henry kicked goal. Nurdyke took Spaeck's place at left end for Colfax. Pullman kicked off to Lommasson, who gained 20 yards on the run back and added four more on a line buck. A forward pass was intercepted by F. Glover and bounded into Price's arms before touching the ground. The speedy little end sprinted 40 yards for a touchdown. Henry kicked goal. Pullman kicked off to Nurdyke, who brought the ball back 10 yards. Colfax made 15 yards on a forward pass to Roberts. Failing to gain through the line, Lommasson punted over Pullman's goal line. The ball was brought out 20 yards. F. Glover gained 12 yards through the line. A forward pass was muffed but the ball bounded into the arms of Williams and netted a gain of 20 yards. Glen Glover added 15 more. Pullman then worked a forward pass from a double pass which completely baffled their opponents and Henry, who received the ball, had a clear field and made a touchdown, from which he failed to kick goal. Pullman kicked off and Goff ran the ball back five yards. Colfax tried an ineffectual forward pass and then punted. Moss let the ball roll, thinking it would go over the goal line, but it stopped four yards inside. Then occurred the spectacular feature of the game. The ball was passed to Glen Glover, who sprinted, dodged, twisted and straight-armed his way through the whole Colfax team for 85 yards. He would easily have scored a touchdown, but ran out of bounds within 10 yards of the goal line. On the next play Pullman fumbled, but recovered the ball. F. Glover smashed through the line for 12 yards and a touchdown, but Pullman was penalized 15 yards for holding and the score was not allowed.
