

PREPARATIONS MADE FOR FARMERS' WEEK

Farmers of State Will Gather in Pullman in Large Numbers February 9-14

Preparations for Farmers' Week at the State College, February 9-14, 1914, are progressing rapidly. The custom should become a permanent one, as it has proven a great success in other states. Many associations of farmers, educators, and clergymen choose it as their time of meeting. All the lectures and discussions are of a popular nature and of practical value. The week is somewhat in the nature of a homecoming week for the farmers of the state. Last year at Cornell University the programs attracted an attendance of over 3000. Registrar F. T. Barnard has completed negotiations for reduced rates from all parts of the state. One and one-third fare on the certificate plan will be given.

In the mornings general sessions will be held, and topics of interest to all will be presented. At 1:30 each day lectures of about one hour in length will be given, and the remainder of the afternoon will be devoted to sectional or group discussions, divided into dairy, live stock, grain growers', fruit growers', and home makers' sections.

Among the general lecturers invited to assist the members of the faculty are Mrs. Josephine Preston, state superintendent of public instruction; H. C. Sampson, secretary of the Northwest Fruit Distributors' Association, J. H. Perkins, State Commissioner of Agriculture, and W. E. Powell, lecturer of the State Grange.

The Agricultural Department has invited L. C. Crow, president of the State Farmers' Union; J. B. Early, a successful Jersey breeder; L. C. Smith, H. C. Davis, and David Monroe, well known Holstein breeders; and C. C. Farr, a member of the Holden alfalfa party, for its discussions of soil fertility, forage crops, co-operation, rural improvement, good roads, rural schools, dairying, live stock, and marketing. These men will assist the faculty of the department.

The Department of Horticulture has invited E. H. Sheppard of Hood River, Ore., editor of "Better Fruit"; W. S. Thornber of Lewiston, Idaho, former head of the Horticulture Department here, and A. G. Craig of Deer Park, formerly an assistant professor at the college. These men, with the horticultural faculty, will discuss crops in young orchards, pruning, side lines for the commercial fruit grower, spraying, marketing, and various other subjects of interest to all fruit growers.

The home makers' section, under the direction of Miss Craig, will be in the nature of a separate division of the Farmers' Week program. The value of scientific methods in the home, dietaries on an allowance of 10, 16, 20, and 30 cents per person, will be demonstrated; textiles from the housekeepers' standpoint, laundry methods, economy in buying and preparing foods, are among the subjects for lecture and demonstration. Miss Ravenhill of Victoria, B. C., has been invited to assist Miss Craig and her staff in this work.

In the evening entertainments of a social and educational nature will be furnished. Every minute of the week will be filled with something of value for everyone. Complete programs will be sent by the registrar upon request.

RESOLUTION No. 200

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Pullman: First. That it is the intention of the City Council to order the improvements of the following streets to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of Main and Spring Streets, thence Westerly along Main Street to the Westerly property line of Grand Street; beginning at the Northerly property line of Paradise Street, thence Northerly along Alder Street to the Palouse River; beginning at the intersection of Olsen and Alder Streets, thence Westerly along Olsen Street to its intersection with Grand Street; beginning at the South Northerly along Grand Street to the South end of bridge crossing the Palouse River.

By filling, grading, curbing and parking said streets, and paving the same and doing such other work as may be necessary in connection therewith, all in accordance with the Plans and Specifications to be prepared by the City Engineer.

Second. That all persons who may desire to object thereto are hereby notified to file such objection with the City Clerk, at his office in the City Hall, on or before the 17th day of February, 1914, or appear and present such objections at a meeting of the City Council to be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Pullman, at

8 o'clock p. m. on the 17th day of February, 1914, which time and place is hereby fixed for hearing on matters relating to said proposed improvement, and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of payment for said improvement.

Third. That the City Engineer shall submit to the City Council at or prior to said date all data and information required by ordinance and law to be submitted.

Fourth. That the costs and expenses of said improvement shall be borne by and assessed to the property liable therefor, as provided by law.

Fifth. That the City Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published for two consecutive issues in The Pullman Herald, the official newspaper of the City, the first publication to be at least fifteen days before the said 17th day of February, 1914.
