W. S. C. AND COLORED GIANTS SATURDAY

State College Nine and Strong Chicago Team Will Meet Saturday on Local Diamond

Washington State College people will get a chance Saturday afternoon to see what is acknowledged to be one of the best baseball teams in the United States line up against the college team. The Chicago Colored Giants have on their team seven men who, according to their manager, could make any big league team in the country if organized baseball did not draw the color line.

This team has beaten nearly all the teams it has played against for the last several years, including exhibition games with big league teams in every large city in the East. For the past six months they have been touring the coast and playing in California during the winter and exhibition games with the Coast and Northwestern League teams this spring. The games they have lost have been few and far between. The real star of their team, according to reports from the West Side, is their shortstop, a 200 pounder, who fields his position faultlessly and is one of their strongest sluggers.

Coach Bender will line up against the Giants the same as against the Spokane Indians last week, with Davis and Morris behind the bat, Hartman, Kernan or Lambeth in the box, Coulter on first, Lester on second, Bohler at short, A. Anderson on third, and Casad, M. Anderson, and Tulley in the outfield. This will be the first appearance in a game at home of the team with the new suits. The game will start at 3:15. Admission to those not holding student tickets or season passes will be 50 cents.

toria College, Wellington, New Zealand, who is investigating American education for the New Zealand government; Miss Louise Cann, magazine writer and novelist, Seattle; and Mrs. Curtis, lecturer on dramatic literature, Seattle.

The Vocational Conference promises to become the most noteworthy educational experiment yet undertaken in the Northwest. On her recent trip Miss White came in contact with 300 successful women who promised to answer any inquiries the women of the college might address to them. This fact alone should be of tremendous value. The idea of the movement is to direct the thoughts of the women of the college to vocations other than teaching and to instill into them the idea that it is positively unethical to enter the teaching profession without any positive qualification for it. From the women who go out of W. S. C. into the various communities of the Northwest the vocational idea should spread to the schools and the homes, that every woman should have a vocation as a means of self-expression and as a gift for the uplifting and enriching of the life of the community.
