Muffins for Two—Butter, size of an egg, one tablespoonful of sugar, one egg. Beat all to a cream and add half a cupful sweet milk, pinch of salt, one cupful of flour and one teaspoonful of baking powder.

Sweet Shortcake—Beat together two eggs, one cup of sweet milk, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one cup sugar and flour to make a cake batter. Pour into two round or square tins and bake as you would cake. When done use for the two layers of the cake, putting fruit between and whipped cream on top or fruit between and on top both.

Pieplant Jelly—Wash and cut the stalks into inch pieces. Cook in water to cover to a soft pulp, and strain, boil and skim. Add a teaspoonful of sugar to each teacupful of juice, and boil until it will jelly on the skimmer, then add vanilla extract to flavor.

Melt paraffin in an old coffee pot. It is a most satisfactory way to pour the wax over the jelly when sealing it. No drops will be spilled upon the table or tray.

At this season of fruit stains, it is well to look carefully to the table linen. If there is a sign of a stain, pour boiling water through it as soon as possible. This will remove all but the stain from peaches. Javelle water is the best medium for this.
