MONEY FOR CROPS

Washington, July 26.—Money from the federal treasury will be deposited in national banks throughout the country again this fall to facilitate the movement of crops and promote business generally. Secretary McAdoo announced tonight that he would put out approximately \$34,000,000, and that he stood ready to increase the amount to any extent necessary to meet the country's needs. Banks in the following cities expressed the opinion that no government deposits will be needed in their localities during the crop-moving season: Portland, Ore.; San Francisco and Los Angeles, Cal.; Tacoma, Wash., and Salt Lake City, Utah. If it should develop later that they or any of them require deposits their applications will be given consideration.

National banks in Seattle and Spokane, Wash., indicated their desire for crop-moving deposits, and government funds will be deposited with them.

Interest at the rate of two per cent per annum will be charged, and the government will accept as security government bonds at par, state, municipal, railroad and other bonds, acceptable to the secretary, at 75 per cent of their par value; approved commercial paper, acceptable to the secretary, at 75 per cent of its face value. The secretary will not require, as he did last year, that 10 per cent of the deposits shall be secured by government bonds.

All collateral offered as security must be approved by a local committee appointed by the clearing house in each city and by a representative of the government chosen by the secretary. In sub-treasurer cities the assistant treasurer of the United States, in addition to the government's special representative, will be a member of the local committee.


