## WHITMAN GIVES STATE COLLEGE CLOSE SHAVE

Bangs' Toe Responsible for Winning Point in Our Fourth Conference Game Saturday—Score 7-6

By giving every ounce of strength they had to the game Bender's football team returned Sunday from Spokane a badly battered aggregation, but happy with their one-point victory over Whitman College. Only in the last quarter was the game pulled from the fire, when Billy Smith, midget halfback and former quarter, squirmed across the Whitman goal line and gave Bangs the opportunity of winning the game by his goal kick.

The class of football was far from approaching the standard of the O. A. C. game, but two teams never fought harder than the two Saturday. The State College team entered the game with four substitutes for star players and when Dietz was taken from the game with a dislocated elbow the head of the kicking department was gone.

In Hoover and McDonald Hahn has two of the fastest, shiftest backs in the conference, and they were continually pulling off dazzling plays that were usually good for 15 or 20 yards. The game was a hard one on nerves, for neither team was sure of victory until the final whistle stopped hostilities.

A large number of W. S. C. people attended the game, and the band was sent up by the Rooter Club. The cheering was a feature of the game.

W. S. C. played on the defensive until Whitman had scored and then used offensive tactics and had the ball on Whitman's 19-yard line at the end of the first half.

In the third quarter W. S. C. started with a rush and soon had the ball on Whitman's 10-yard line, only to lose 30 yards on account of holding. Bangs punted over the goal line and the ball was put in play on Whitman's 20-yard line. W. S. C. got the ball on downs and when Bangs kicked Heg was tripped as he was going down on the ball. Whitman was penalized 15 yards, which put them on their two-yard line, and on the next down Baker punted out of bounds on their 17-yard line.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter W. S. C. had the ball on Whitman's 10-yard line. Bangs made five yards and first down, but this was as far as they could go, losing the ball on downs. Baker punted 35 yards but a forward pass to Heg and a couple of runs by Bangs and Bernard with a Whitman penalty put the ball back on Whitman's four-yard line. Again Whitman was penalized, this time half the distance to their goal. Smith then went through for a touchdown and Bangs kicked goal.

W. S. C. kicked to Whitman, but they failed to gain and were forced to kick. W. S. C. made first down three times straight before they were forced to kick back. Whitman tried a forward pass on the fourth down, but Tyrer broke through and spoiled it. Loomis made two yards just as the whistle blew.


